1926 - 2022

We started to put together the Platinum Jubilee Celebration issue in early September. That is when we learnt of the death of the Queen. Many words have been spoken and written during the mourning period. The Parish Council and villagers showed their condolences in many ways. Village flags flew at half-mast and special services and opportunities to reflect and remember took place.

We have decided to complete the Jubilee celebration record of what we did in Hutton Cranswick. As we found out when Year 5 and 6 interviewed those villagers who

remembered the Queen's coronation – recording activities and events in words and pictures is an important part of celebrating our heritage and help us to recount our experiences.

In the October Bulletin we republished an article which summarised the life and times of Queen Elizabeth II. We have now tried to focus on the activities we organised this summer. All school children at the primary school will receive a copy and as usual our team of volunteer deliverers will make sure each household in the village has a copy – Thank you.

The remarkable success of her 2022 Platinum Jubilee was a sign of just how much she had retained the affections of her people; a particularly well-received highlight was a charming cameo performance showing her having tea with the children's television character, Paddington Bear. Apart from in dreams, in which she was often popularly supposed to appear, the Queen's most regular contact with her subjects was in her annual Christmas message on television and radio. This not only reflected her work and engagements over the previous year, but it reaffirmed, with greater frankness and clarity than many of her ministers seemed able to summon, her deeply held Christian faith.

As head of the Church of England she was herself a Christian leader and she never forgot it. The Christmas message adapted over the years to new technology, but it was unchanging in style and content, reflecting the monarchy as she shaped it. Under Elizabeth II, the British monarchy survived by changing its outward appearance without changing its public role. Republican critics of monarchy had long given up demanding its immediate abolition and accepted that the Queen's personal popularity rendered their aim impracticable while she was still alive. Elizabeth II, whose 70-year reign makes her the longest reigning monarch in British history, leaves her successor with a sort of British monarchical republic, in which the

proportions of its ingredients of mystique, ceremony, populism and openness have been constantly changed in order to keep it essentially the same. It has long been acknowledged by political leaders and commentators all over the world that the Queen handled her often difficult and delicate constitutional role with grace and remarkable, even formidable, political skill.

Her wisdom and unceasing sense of duty meant she was widely viewed with a combination of respect, esteem, awe and affection, which transcended nations, classes and generations. She was immensely proud of Britain and its people, yet in the end she belonged to the world, and the world will mourn her passing.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee 2022


In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, seventy years of service, having acceded to the throne on 6th February 1952 when Her Majesty was 25 years old.

An extended bank holiday, from Thursday 2nd to Sunday 5th June, provided an opportunity for communities and people throughout the United Kingdom to come together to celebrate the historic milestone. Across the four days the celebrations included public events and community activities, as well as national moments of reflections on The Queen's 70 years of service. Many groups took part in the celebrations.

What happened in Hutton Cranswick

With the announcement of an extended public bank holiday and an opportunity for the village to celebrate, a group of villagers got together in January 2022 to generate ideas and start to put a plan together.

A meeting was organised by Janet Foreman and Melvyn Teare and were joined by Trish Barker, Ann Cooper, Ruth Pickles, Tracey Hardcastle, Sue Wardell, Heather Teare, Emma Skipp, Pearl Dyson, Summer Tovey, Kate Tovey, Gina Simpson, Ian Lidster, Margaret Lonsdale, Mike Lonsdale, Ian Sanderson, Louise Sanderson, Carol Cooper, Mike Wardell, Val Thompson, Sally Gowthorpe, Frances Johnson, Elaine Baker, Tara Lock, Erica Tennison, Jenny Read. A subsequent meeting in March also included Richard Alderton, Fiona Bone and Sally Jones.

Ideas came forward resulting in lots of different events to celebrate the Jubilee: -

Souvenir edition of The Bulletin:

there was an overwhelming desire to create a record of the way people in Hutton Cranswick celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The idea to produce a Souvenir edition of The Bulletin received enormous support throughout the village. The Bulletin received funding from ERYC through the Parish Council to assist in the production of this special 28-page edition to record activities and events in the village. A copy will be delivered into all homes and will be available to circulate to friends of Hutton Cranswick.

Commemorative mug- the Parish Council commissioned the creation of a commemorative mug for a keepsake for all the children of Primary School age in the Parish. There are also a surplus number of mugs for sale. The mug was an earthenware white mug, decorated with the official Platinum Jubilee Logo on the front and the village flag emblem and the words: Hutton Cranswick on the reverse.

A commemorative badge, lanyard and key ring were also created - **pages 10 and 11**

Year 5 and Year 6 at the Primary School interviewed villagers telling of their memories of previous Royal events including the Queen's Coronation. The interviews proved a remarkable success. The stories and photographs are on **pages 12 to 15**.

On the 27 May a **Tea party for school children** was held at Foreman's garage, where the Chairman of the Parish Council presented year groups with the Jubilee keep-sake commemorative mugs. It was a fantastic afternoon of fun - **pages 16 and 17**.

On the 28 May a **Jubilee Craft and Produce Market** took place at Foreman's Garage, which was well attended attracting local producers, villagers and visitors.

On the 2 to 5 June a **Memorabilia exhibition** was held at St Peter's Church displaying memorabilia from previous royal celebrations - **page 25**

On 4 June the **bellringers at St Peter's Hutton** rang the Church bells between 19:52 until 20:22 - **page 25**.

On the 2 June a **BBQ and Beacon Bonfire** was held at the SRA with an evening of entertainment and activities to celebrate the Jubilee which ended with the lighting of the Beacon Bonfire at 9.45 pm - **pages 18 and 19**.

On the 4 June an **Open Afternoon** with refreshments took place at the Hutton Cranswick Bowls Club - **page 25**.


On the 4 June some of the streets of the village joined in a competition to find the **best dressed street** for the Jubilee celebrations - **page 24**.

On the 5 June a **Parade**, from the School around the Green, by community groups depicting one of the 7 decades of Royal Service, at midday, a Churches Together service on the Green, followed by the Big Jubilee Picnic on The Green - **pages 20 and 21**.

The Village Show took place on The Green in July. An opportunity to showcase what is great about our village - Show Tent, Craft Stalls, good food, Dog Show, Best dressed Tractors and of course the Tug of War competition . **Pages 22 and 23**



1952 - 2022. They also supplied appropriate images which could be used on souvenirs.

The mug is decorated on the reverse with the village flag emblem and the following words: Hutton Cranswick. The likely cost is £3.95 for each mug. The proposed sale price is £5.00. Enquiries were also made with a local china mug producer but sadly he had gone out of business due to ill health.

Local supplier H and K Embroidery were commissioned to produce the mugs. The finished mug, in a presentation box for safe carrying, were presented by the Parish Council Chairman and Parish Councillors at the Platinum Jubilee Tea Party.

All children in the village under the age of 11 were offered a commemorative mug. Any eligible child in the village who has not received their mug, then their parent should contact the Parish Clerk, Steve Sanderson on 270058.

The children in the Playgroup, which meets at the Methodist hall, opted to have a commemorative medal. These medals, along with key rings and pin badges were produced by the Driffeld Cobbler.

All items are still on sale at the regular 4th Saturday market at Foreman's Garage.

Many souvenirs were created for the celebrations. From a simple cloth badge to more complex and expensive items



Hutton Cranswick Platinum Jubilee Interviews: Year 5



Year 5 and 6 at the Primary School interviewed a selection of those village residents who experienced watching the 1953 Coronation, or took part in 1977 Silver Jubilee celebrations, or remembered a Royal Visit and other Royal related events.

The Jubilee interviews took place on Tuesday 24th May at the Bowls Club. Refreshments were served and a Platinum Jubilee memento given to each person interviewed.

What follows over the next four pages are some of the transcribed interview records and a selection of pictures from the day.

An interview with Sonia

In 1953, Sonia was twenty years old when the Queen Had her coronation. She was born in 1933.

When we asked Sonia if she had ever met the Queen. She told us that she unfortunately hadn't but was lucky enough to have seen Princess Margaret.

Sonia knew that Queen was the incredible age of 95.

Sonia remebered the Queen's Golden Jubilee. She told us that she remeberd the war too because she was 89 years old.

Shockingly, Valerie hasn't attended any celebration for the Queen.


Does anything remind you of the Queen like music or food?

Platinum Jubilee Parade & Service






Map site Parade and Plan Vers 4 2022

Royal Tour 1972

February 7th 1972 - I was toasting my toes in front of the fire in East Yorkshire. The telephone rang, and despite my protestations about being on leave, the Ministry of Defence (Navy) requested my presence in Singapore. Two days later a very reluctant radio officer arrived in Singapore still protesting about the leave he was still owed. A car at the airport whisked me across the island to what had been the Naval Base. I boarded the Royal Fleet Auxiliary vessel Blue Rover.

That was when one of my juniors put me in the picture - we were on a Royal Tour. Why me you might ask! The Blue Rover was the second of a new class of fleet auxiliary and I had sailed on the first one, the Green Rover. No other senior radio officer had experience of that class of vessel so I was elected to replace the current officer after he fell down a flight of stairs and broke his hip.

I barely had time to shower and change into white uniform before we were at sea. I think it took me two days to shake off the jet lag and by that time we had been and gone from the port of Malacca. Actually on board the Blue Rover we never entered a Malaysian port - that was the task of the Royal Yacht Britannia. Our ship and the escorting Royal Naval frigate remained at sea outside each port.

The royal routine in port appeared to be that the Queen and Duke left the Britannia around 10a.m. They returned to the ship around 4p.m. having shaken hands with umpteen dignitaries, viewed displays of dancing and various other duties that their royal role required. About 7p.m. various selected dignitaries would board the yacht

for dinner with the Queen. They would leave about 9 or later and be entertained by the Royal Marine Band before the ship sailed

again. British commerce in the form of assorted businessmen arrived in the same port the next day.

I know we visited at least three Malaysian ports including Penang but quite frankly my mind was still half back in East Yorkshire. I think I finally came round as we passed from the Straights of Malacca into the Bay of Bengal. We sailed between the northern tip of Indonesia and the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. I for one was looking forward to a few days of peace before we arrived at the Maldives but it wasn't to be. A message was received to the effect that several fishermen from the Maldives were overdue and missing.

Our three ships formed a search line across the ocean with the Royal Yacht in the centre of the line. The frigate's helicopter was able to extend the line of search and it was the helicopter that located the missing men. They were transferred to the Britannia where they were given medical treatment before eventually being landed in Male, the capital of the Maldivian islands. Once again only the royal party landed in the Maldives.

After the Maldives we sailed southwest towards the Seychelle Islands where we finally got to go ashore. The string of islands

that form the Seychelles are both low lying coral islands and others with a mountainous interior. Our three ships initially were allocated a coral island each. I got to feel sand between my toes and coconut palms waving above. We had a two day break there. After that we moved on to Port Victoria, The capital of the Seychelles on the island of Mahe. Again only the royal party went ashore. However, before we sailed again the Queen and Duke visited the Blue Rover and I got to shake the Queen's hand. She was thanking us for our escort duties because she knew she was leaving the Britannia in her next port of call, Mombasa.

We escorted the yacht to within sight of Mombasa before we turned and returned to Singapore. The Queen left the yacht there and went on to visit Treetops, the very spot where she had learned years earlier that she had become Queen on the death of her father.

Memories of Coronation Day 1953

On Coronation Day I was nearly 7 and didn't really understand what all the fuss was about, neither did my brother who was just 5. My mother was up early making boxes of sandwiches, cakes and fruit and filling bottles of diluted fruit juice which were all packed into big shopping bags. Dad was outside trying to get his ancient Wolseley Hornet car to go in the rain – it had holes in the floor and leaked. Not many people had a TV and we had been invited to one of his colleagues' house for the day to watch the Coronation. TVs then were very small with fuzzy lines across in various shades of grey. (Black and White TVs were a misnomer!). All the curtains were drawn and doors shut to keep out the light and as kids we had to sit on the floor all day.

I remember it was a very long day and we hadn't to talk as the grown-ups were concentrating to hear the grainy TV commentary which was ponderous and slow. The best

bits were the soldiers and the music.

After we returned home we found long sticks and marched around trying to be soldiers. We found some dressing up clothes and made a cardboard crown which we decorated. As I was the only girl in our gang I was always Maid Marian when we played Robin Hood, but this time I was the Queen with a crown and a long sheet trailing behind. The boys didn't want to be my ladies-in-waiting! The Coronation certainly fired us with more imaginative make-believe because we had actually "seen" the Queen!

A few weeks later we were taken to the cinema in Hull to watch the whole Coronation again, in colour!! It wasn't as long as the TV broadcast and had more marching to trumpets and drums and less talking. This gave us even more ideas for dressing up!

I look back on those early post-war years and realise now that the excitement of the Coronation was THE antidote to the gloom of the aftermath of

deprivations during the war, rationing and fuel shortages. We had to learn to "do without". Mass consumerism didn't appear until I had left childhood behind. The mantra was always "Save for a rainy day" by scrimping and saving. Nothing was wasted – we fed compost heaps, unpicked jumpers and re-knitted them, saved all our buttons, hooks and eyes and material and only lit a fire in one room in the evening. Life was centred around the kitchen and the vegetable garden. Many people kept chickens and some even had a pig to eat the waste. We had a pig-swill man come round to collect our garden waste, and the rag-and-bone man collected anything which couldn't be reused. Our dustbins were never full and mostly consisted of ashes from the fire-grate. All my outer clothes were hand-me-downs from my cousin. The bakery sold us mini-Hovis loaves for a farthing for our dolls' tea parties. (There were 960 farthings to the pound! They were no longer used after the end of 1960). As children we entertained ourselves building

dens, going on bike rides, dressing up in mother's old clothes and high heeled shoes, being the Lone Ranger, Davy Crocket, cowboys and indians, playing cricket, attending each other's birthday parties, having sing songs, camp fires and generally getting lots of fresh air and exercise. We were never allowed to leave anything on our plates and we didn't.

Eventually the serious side of life hit us with termly exams and the 11 plus scholarship. Noses started hitting the grind stone more seriously as our happy-go-lucky childhood began to disappear. It is lovely to think our parents let us have the freedom to develop and gave us the opportunity to follow our preferences and talents. While I would not like to go back to the deprivations of the time, we learnt about frugality, cleanliness and kindness. Rudeness and swearing never was allowed and politeness and courtesy were definitely expected. "Children should be seen and not heard" was the mantra then. Mmmm . . .
