



Five unusual energy-saving tips to help you slash your bills

How to spend less money on gas and electricity is on everyone's minds. These somewhat unusual energy-saving tips will not only cut costs but will also help to conserve resources for future generations.

1. Vacuum your fridge

Keeping your fridge clean and organised can help save energy in two ways. First, by cleaning the coils (at the back), you can keep your fridge running more efficiently, which will reduce the amount of energy it uses.

Second don't overcrowd the fridge, as enabling cool air to circulate will keep the temperature at an optimal level. This will prevent the cooling system from having to work harder to keep the food cold, thus saving energy.

2. Get more from your kettle

Remove limescale from your kettle: a descaled kettle boils quicker and so uses less energy. But be aware that if your appliances are getting on in age, it may be better to replace them with more energy-efficient upgrades which can save even more money in the long run.

Use a thermos flask for any leftover kettle water. Not only does it mean that any excess water you've just boiled doesn't go to waste, but it also means you've got boiling water when you need it without having to reboil the kettle again.

3. Heat one room efficiently

Heat only specific areas that you use the most. Do this with the radiator thermostats, or perhaps using a smart thermostat with multiple zone setting. This avoids wasting energy to heat the entire house. By heating only the areas you need, you are also putting less strain on your heating system. And limiting the amount of air that needs to be heated reduces the amount of dust and other contaminants.

You should make sure to put on layers of clothes so that you can be comfortable without having to crank up the thermostat.

You might also want to think about rearranging your furniture to make sure that your radiators have enough space to breathe. Leaving a gap between any furniture or

curtains lets the air circulate properly, which means you are heating your room in the most efficient way possible.

4. Consider going off-peak

Some energy suppliers offer cheaper tariffs if you run your appliances during off-peak times when fewer people are demanding energy supplies.

Your washing machine, dishwasher and tumble dryer are often the highest energy using appliances. Avoiding using them during the peak hours of 4pm to 9pm will result in lower electricity costs if you have an off-peak tariff. It will also reduce strain on the electricity grid and cut the need for additional energy production at peak times, which can reduce emissions from power plants.

5. Unplug devices, close doors and do the washing up

Focusing on your own behaviour matters the most when it comes to energy conservation.

Also be more conscious of turning off unwanted lights, closing the doors when leaving a room to conserve the heat and unplugging devices that are not being used.

For small loads of dirty dishes, you should wash them by hand in a small amount of water rather than running a dishwasher half empty. Use pan lids when cooking to reduce the amount of energy used.

HELP FOR OIL USERS

The government's Household Support Fund will help vulnerable households with the rising cost of heating oil. Grants will be available to eligible residents in East Yorkshire: in general this means people with limited resources or who have a long-term health condition. Eligible households will receive an oil delivery of approx. 500 litres and free membership to the YORSwitch Bulk Oil Buying Scheme for the year (normally £20 per year).

Wonderful churches of the East Riding

The village of Garton on the Wolds is just two miles from Driffield on the A166 to York. About half way through the village, a left turn into Station Road leads to the church of **St Michael and All Angels**. The church dates from the 12th century. In the 19th century it was one of some 15 churches which were restored by local landowners the Sykes family of Sledmere.



St Michael's is remarkable for the lavish programme of interior decoration commissioned by Sir Tatton Sykes in 1872. This includes wall paintings covering all of the

walls, depicting scenes from the bible. Below the wall paintings there is a dado of glazed Spanish tiles, and the roof also features striking decoration. During the 20th century the wall decoration deteriorated considerably and was restored between 1987 and 1995. The interior of this church remains a remarkable example of Victorian art and devotion.



St Michael and All Angels is open daily from 10am to 4pm. Morning prayer is held at 9.30am on the 1st Sunday of each month and Communion on the 3rd Sunday. For further information contact the vicar on 01377 219471.

Looking for a new author?

Try John Banville, says Philip Shields.

John Banville is an Irish novelist, presently aged 76 and living in

Dublin. He is the author of some 27 novels and has received many prestigious literary awards, including the 2005 Man Booker prize for *The Sea*.

The attraction of Banville's style is the way he uses language in a vivid, poetic and often surprising way to express, say, a feeling, an experience or a reflection on a past event. His writing has been described as "perfectly crafted, beautiful, dazzling".

In *The Sea* the narrator recalls how he spent a holiday as a child in a seaside guest house, when he witnessed some life-changing events. He says "*The past beats inside me like a second heart*". In *Shroud* a young woman has died and her father visits the hotel room where she had been staying: "*The room was so full of her not being there*". Here are some more examples:

"A beggar will approach me, toothless and foul smelling, and I will have an urge to open wide my arms and crush him against my breast in a burning, brotherly embrace, instead of which, of course, I will dodge past him, swivelling my eyes away from the spectacle of his misery and keeping my tight fists firmly plunged in my pockets".

"A grandfather clock directly behind my chair clicked its tongue in large, slow, monotonous disapproval".

"Tell me this world is not the strangest place, stranger even than what the gods would have invented, did they exist".

As well as the books in his own name, Banville has published several under the pen name **Benjamin Black**. These are more conventional novels, set in Dublin in the 1950s and centred on the state pathologist Quirke who meddles in the work of the police. These stories are easy to read but still use powerful language to evoke an atmosphere: "In the muffled silence the city seemed bewildered, like a man whose sight has suddenly failed".

So, what would be a good introduction to Banville's work? His recent novel *Snow*, though published in Banville's name, is more in the style of the Benjamin Black series. It describes how a young police inspector in 1950s Ireland is sent to investigate the murder of a priest in the home of one of the gentry. And as well as "The Sea", I also particularly like the "Cleave" trilogy: *Eclipse, Shroud* and *Ancient Light*.

A good range of his work is available through East Riding Libraries. Just don't expect a riveting pageturner – it's all about the mood evoked through the beauty of the language.



Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 21st December, 2022. The meeting was held at the WI Hall, Main Street, Cranswick and commenced at 7.00 pm.

Present: Councillors: Alderton, Holtby, Ingham, Kelly, Richardson (in the Chair), Sibley-Calder, Mrs Simpson, Swan, Teare, Wilkinson. Ward Councillor: Dewhirst. The Clerk recorded the minutes.

22/283 Apologies: Councillors: Lock, Poolford, Thompson. Ward Councillor: Evison.

22/284 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests: -

Cllr Ingham - Item 10(a) Minute 22/291(a) – Non-pecuniary – In-Bloom Member.

Cllr Mrs Simpson - Items 10(a)(b) Minutes 22/291(a)(b) – Non-pecuniary – In-Bloom Member/SRA Committee

22/285 Minutes – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 23rd November, 2022, be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Ingham).

22/286 Financial Monitoring – The monitoring report, payments, receipts, variances, current account cashflow and bank statements and bank reconciliation (£116,722.90) as at month 9 were noted. The bank statement and bank reconciliation were verified and signed by Cllr Teare, being a member other than the Chairman and cheque signatory.

22/287 Precept 2023 -24 — East Riding of Yorkshire Council had confirmed the 2023-24 tax base for Hutton Cranswick Parish Council as 823 for Band D equivalent properties, this was compared to 844 for 2022-23. An explanation of the reduction from a senior accountant at East Riding of Yorkshire Council was noted.

In setting the Local Precept Demand, Councillors considered the financial burden on residents and the impact on Council's budgets, now and in the longer term. It was **Resolved** (a) not to increase the parish council tax element of the Council Tax Bill paid by residents, with the Band D charge remaining at £45.02, (b) submit a Local Precept Demand of £37,051.00, for the financial year ending 31st March, 2024, to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and (c) earmark £1590.43 from reserves to support the 2023-24 budget (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Swan).

22/289 Planning Matters – The following decisions were noted:

- (a) 21/00064/REFUSE: Outline Residential development (Access to be considered) (Resubmission of 17/03880/STOUT) (20/01548/STOUT) Land South of Williamsfield Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9BH Appeal Refusal of planning permission Informal Hearing Appeal Dismissed.
- (b) 22/03587/TPO TPO HUTTON VILLAGE 1973 (REF 330) HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Crown reduce 1 no Lime (T1) by 2 metres overall, Crown reduce 1 no Swedish whitebeam (T2) by 1.5 metres overall. All pruning back to suitable growth points, to create balanced shapes, to allow more light into garden and to maintain proportions of boundary trees. Trees are located in the church yard and are overhanging the boundary at St Peters Church, Church Lane, Hutton, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9PS Works to Protected Trees Consent Granted.

22/290 Planning Application:

(a) 22/03886/PLF: Erection of a single storey extension to rear, following removal of existing conservatory at 57 Laburnum Avenue, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QH – Full Planning Permission – Resolved – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Alderton/seconded Cllr Wilkinson).

22/291 Representatives reports: -

- (a) In Bloom As a result of its recent successes, the group had been offered an opportunity to be nominated for the national competition. By majority, it was decided to concentrate on rebuilding the group and remain as competitors at regional level in 2023. The group was to focus on the overall village entry to Yorkshire in Bloom in good time for the closing date of 31st March, 2023 and encourage groups in the village to enter other competition categories. There was no Spring Judging in 2023. The Summer Judging was between 1st and 16th July, 2023 with the presentation of awards in September/October. No meeting had been planned for the immediate future, but with the grant received from Northern Railway, there would be additional input at the Station when the time was right. Two new volunteers had joined the group.
- **(b) SRA** The issue of dogs fouling the playing field was still a concern and the idea of dog owners being required to keep their pets on a lead at all times was being considered. Advice was to be sought from the dog warden regarding the provision of bins, signage and any other steps the Committee can consider taking.

The cost of the replacement of the kitchen following the water damage was to be through insurance. Quotes for the works were awaited.

Expressions of interest had been received for the Assistant Groundsperson vacancy.

The committee had finalised the plans for the new build, there had been no change to the original design that was approved in 2019. It was **Resolved** to approve a request that the application be in the name of the Parish Council (proposed Cllr. Swan/seconded Cllr Sibley-Calder).

- (c) Pond It was agreed the pond lights remain on until the end of February, 2023. The Clerk was to arrange for the maintenance work on the pond be undertaken as soon as practical.
- **22/292 External Auditor** The appointment of PKF Littlejohn LLP as the external auditor for the 2022-23 financial year and for a further 5-year period until 2026-27 was noted.
- **22/293** Centenary Wood Cllr Kelly was to present a costed proposal for a new post for the owl box.
- **22/294 Queen's Canopy Project New Woodland at the SRA** The Landowner Declaration for the partnership between The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) and the Parish Council had been signed. The planting of the Woodland was planned for the 30th and 31st January, 2023. The SRA Committee had been informed.

The Council aimed to promote the planting days to allow volunteers from the village to get involved.

22/295 Risk Register – Resolved to accept the changes (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Richardson).

22/296 Salt Bin – During the recent cold weather, due to the icy conditions, a car had done a full turn at the junction of Southgate and the Green. A resident had requested a new salt bin be provided. It was noted there were already two salt bins on the Green, one of which was at the end of Southgate at the junction with Main Street. It was **Resolved** to apply to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council for a new salt bin at the junction of Sycamore Avenue and Laburnum Avenue, close to Southgate (proposed Cllr Kelly/seconded Cllr Wilkinson).

22/297 Village Taskforce Satisfaction Survey 2022 – The Clerk would complete the survey and inform the Village Taskforce of any work that remained outstanding.

A review was to be carried out of the arrangements to make the defibrillators rescue ready after their use.

DEFIBRILLATORS IN HUTTON CRANSWICK

Most of us are aware of defibrillators now. They are common and they are often used. The commonest cause of cardiac death in adults results from an electrical rhythm disturbance in the heart resulting in it being unable to pump properly and therefore supply the body with oxygen. If CPR is not undertaken quickly, the brain is starved of oxygen and in approximately three minutes the person dies.

CPR on its own will only prolong life, but the way to get the person back to a normal electrical rhythm, and save them, is to use a defibrillator. The defibrillator is a device that provides an electric shock across the heart that 'reboots' the heart. Essentially stopping it and allowing it to restart in a normal rhythm. This will not work every time, and will depend on the type of electrical problem the heart is in. Several years ago, with the aid of the Hutton Cranswick Parish Council and some sponsorship, we were lucky enough to obtain two defibrillators:

The one on the White Horse pub wall (kindly hosted by the landlord), has been used several times.





The one on the wall of the SRA, to my knowledge has not been used, although is has been taken out of its case to help in a situation. It remains





there to help with any incidents that might occur whilst individuals are undertaking sport on the ground.

How to access to defibrillators

Both defibrillators are in lockable cases which are warmed to keep them fully active even in the coldest winter. They are locked to prevent vandalism and prevent persons removing them inappropriately.

To access the defibrillators, all that is required is to call 999, as you would normally in an emergency.

Once the triage operator has assessed the situation, if deemed appropriate, you will be told to go to one of the defibrillators (or send someone else) and be given a code to open the cabinet. Both are the same and work on a mechanical push button system.

This method of obtaining the defibrillator has two benefits:

- An ambulance or first responder will be on the way to help you.
- A trained operator will help you use the machine.



Both machines have a similar format in that the case is opened and you will see an array of buttons and some pads to place on the collapsed persons chest wall. As the cases are opened, either will start talking to you and explain carefully each step that you have to do (the SRA defibrillator has to have the on/off button pressed first):

The person's chest is exposed to bare skin, cleaned of any water/sweat (if necessary) and the pads are placed on the skin at the

places pointed out on the diagram on the pads. The machine will then do its work. If it tells you a shock is needed, you just stand away from the person and press the flashing button. That is all there is to it.



YOU CANNOT KILL SOMEONE BY GIVING THEM A SHOCK IN ERROR – THE MACHINE WILL NOT ALLOW IT. You can, however, fail to get them back by not using the machine. Children in schools are taught to use these machines and they are getting more common. They save lives and they already have in the Village.

Summary

- If you see/witness a collapse and they are obviously unconscious, call 999. They will advise you what to do but mention if you are near one of the defibrillators. They will give you a code to unlock the case.
- If you know how to undertake CPR do it. If you can, have someone else to get the defibrillator and carry on with the CPR.
- Remember CPR is a holding pattern, it does not bring someone back – defibrillators do.
- Become familiar as to where they are in the villages.

Letter to Hutton Cranswick Parish Council from a local young person

Dear Sir, I think it would be an amazing idea to have a skatepark in Cranswick. I think it would be fun to have one down at the sports recreation association (SRA) for kids of all ages to go down and have an amazing time. At the moment we are having to go to Driffield skatepark and we would be lucky if it is open and if it's shut we have to go to either Bridlington, Beverley, Scarborough, Hull or Hornsea just to find out there is nowhere to park and if we can find somewhere to park it's only for an hour. So if we could get one in Cranswick it would be amazing. Yours sincerely, J.

See the September Parish Council minute 22/219 (in the November Bulletin) for a response. The Council was not supportive but asked the SRA Committee to consider it.

Some advice from SkateboardGB is as follows:

Getting a skateboard park built in your local area is no easy task and is not just as simple as asking your local council for one – It will usually take months / years for it to all go through.

- First form community group Make sure you include skateboarders (and scooter users and BMX's – anyone who will use the park), parents, youth workers and the local skate-shop. It's a good way to show councils, residents and press that you are properly organised and committed to your cause.
- Create an online platform such as a Facebook page, Instagram page or website, showing what you want to achieve and make sure you get as many followers or people involved as possible.
- Convince people why there needs to be a skatepark built. You will need to create a presentation of why it's needed: Focus on keeping people active, the growth of adrenaline sports, the need for a facility as there are no others around (or only old facilities) etc. You may want to show some examples of what type of skatepark you want to achieve and propose some potential sites where the skatepark could be located, along with associated costs
- Do some fund-raising. This will show that you are committed to the development of the project. This can be done a variety of ways, but think about holding a skate comp, get the local skate-shop involved, sponsored skaters and bikers, and invite the press and councillors. The more publicity you can get the more support you will find.
