

Count the Cost

I like the season of autumn – the cool fresh air and the beautiful colours of the trees – but it comes with the sacrifice of daylight as nights draw in and that darkness can consume my energy. Then again Christmas is coming and streets, houses and shops start to light up with a wide variety of bright colours and the darkness is overcome.

November is a very odd month for me. I like the fact that it is my birthday, but that is saddened by it being close to Remembrance Day with its tragic reminders of wars past and present. When I was reflecting on these things my mind settled on war and the cost of war – the tragic loss of lives and homes, whole communities destroyed and so much sadness for those who survive, not to mention the financial cost of this devastation. As I wondered what the cost of the present war in Ukraine was, on every level, I googled 'count the cost'. To my surprise this bible verse came up from **Luke 14:28:**

But don't begin until you count the cost. For who would begin construction of a building without first calculating the cost to see if there is enough money to finish it?

It made me wonder how many leaders really count the cost before entering into a war. If they knew in advance the sacrifices made by so many, and saw the devastation, would they really go ahead? After all, what is the point of winning if the prize is totally broken when you get it?

It will soon be Christmas again and I wondered how many of us will be buying for Christmas without first counting the cost, especially this year when the cost of merely living is rising so fast. Last year a survey by KIS Finance revealed that 57% of people planned to take out additional credit in order to cover the costs of Christmas. How many worked out the real cost with interest I wonder? Now war and Christmas may seem an odd comparison, but I know through my work as a Community Money Advice volunteer that debt can bring plenty of misery of its own. There are of course many unavoidable reasons for accruing unmanageable debt – loss of job, addiction, illness and relationship breakdown being the most common – but it can also be caused by that desire to have just a little more than we can afford. Advertisements and peer pressure are powerful influences and that phrase 'because you are worth it' is a pet hate of mine, especially as the product it describes is usually an unnecessary luxury.


Life is one big balancing act and we all make hundreds of decisions every day, from what to wear and eat to who we share our lives with and how we spend our time. Being a Christian really does help me with many decisions. Firstly Jesus has many things to say about priorities. He tells us in Matthew Chapter 6 not to worry about what we wear and what we eat and drink. While I do think about these things, I try to get them in perspective. I hate being seduced into spending money on unnecessary things – money that could do more good if spent elsewhere. I also hate it when I waste time doing something that turns out not to be of any use to me or anyone else. Recently I answered a questionnaire about Christmas for a glossy magazine and they contacted me to say they we going to use something I had written. Knowing that I had made many references to the real meaning of Christmas and church I was disappointed to find that the quotation they were using was about cooking Christmas dinner! I bet when the article comes

out there will be no reference at all to what I call 'real Christmas'. The bible story of Jesus's birth and all that follows is truly life changing for Christians.

If you are worried about the cost of the commercial Christmas this year maybe you could focus on the real meaning of 'Christmas' because that is so much more satisfying than the commercial version, and it is free! The love of God that Jesus came to tell us about is free. The churches will be celebrating with many special services and events and they are all free. Family and friendship are free and you will find them in abundance if you look to God. We at St Peter's pray for your hearts to be full of love because the love from God is both free, and priceless. I also pray that you will count the cost of all you do, and spend, this November and with God's help may your hearts and lives be full of peace as you prepare for this exciting time in the Christian calendar. Yorkshire in Bloom Awards – results at last

Hutton Cranswick Village in Bloom was awarded a Gold Medal in the Large Village Category of the Royal Horticultural Society Yorkshire in Bloom competition. The Award Ceremony took place on Thursday 6th October at a



new venue – the Riley-Smith Hall in Tadcaster. The judges were particularly complimentary about our efforts to move more towards perennial plantings and removing small containers to improve maintenance and reduce the need for constant watering.

As an objective for the future, the judges suggested creating a series of bee corridors throughout the village using bee haven plants in all the plantings in the village



and to involve the whole village – young and old. Watch this space.

Also, James White Butchers entered in the Small Business Category and received a Silver Gilt Medal. James has been entering the competition for a number of years and has always maintained a high standard.

The Gold Medal is welcome as it signifies that the village is still able to maintain a high standard in spite of Covid lockdowns, high temperatures and drought.





Hutton Cranswick Parish Council

Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 28th September, 2022. The meeting was held at the WI Hall, Main Street, Cranswick and commenced at 7.00 pm.

Present: Councillors: Alderton, Ingham, Kelly, Holtby, Poolford, Richardson (in the Chair), Sibley-Calder, Mrs Simpson, Swan, Teare. Ward Councillor: Evison. Two Parishioners. Five representatives from the National Grid Projects Community Relations Team. The Clerk recorded the minutes

A minute's silence was observed as a mark of respect for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Councillors enjoyed biscuits, sent by the scouts, as a thank you for all the Parish Council did for the village.

22/200 Apologies: Councillors: Lock, Thompson, Wilkinson. Ward Councillors: Dewhirst, Owen.

22/201 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests: -

Cllr Ingham Item 10(a) Minute 22/209(a) – Non-pecuniary – In-Bloom Member.

Cllr Mrs Simpson - Items 10(a)(b) Minute 22/209(a)(b) - Non-pecuniary - In-Bloom Member/SRA Committee.

22/202 Minutes – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 27th July, 2022 be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Poolford).

22/203 SEGL2 – A planning application to construct a new high voltage cable from Peterhead in Aberdeenshire to Drax in North Yorkshire had been submitted by the National Grid. After travelling under the sea from Peterhead, the cable would come ashore at Wilsthorpe. The cable would then run underground onshore to Drax. The route of the cable was planned to cross the A164 close to the crossroads at Hutton Balk. The Projects Community Relations Team gave a brief outline of the works and how it could impact on the village. A detailed programme would only be known when a construction contractor had been appointed. A Community Benefit Fund would be available. A further briefing was to be arranged.

The Chairman thanked the team for their attendance at the meeting.

22/204 Public Participation – A resident requested that the Parish Council approach East Riding of Yorkshire Council to propose that a 30-mph speed limit was implemented on Burnbutts Lane, from the junction of Beverley Road (A164) to a small distance after The Bungalow. Cllr Evison agreed to investigate the matter.

Tree of Heaven as they are poor specimens, of low amenity value and cause excessive shading at 85 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QN Tree Works in Conservation Areas Resolved Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Alderton/seconded Cllr Richardson).

22/209 Representatives reports: -

(a) In Bloom – Four members would attend the Yorkshire in Bloom Awards Ceremony on the 6th October, 2022. A group meeting was held on the 13th September, 2022. It had been necessary for some of the areas of responsibility to be re-allocated due to changes in availability of some of the volunteers, a couple of areas had still to be allocated. The sink at the entrance to Willow Court and the large metal planter at the junction of Laburnum Avenue/Beech View had become reductant and were to be removed.

Thanks go to volunteers from Hymers College, as part of the National Citizen Service project, for making considerable improvements to the look at the Station by; dismantling 3 worn out wooden barrels, cutting back greenery, re-painting all the black wooden trellis fencing at the back of both platforms, and generally clearing any weedy areas. Northern Railway has provided a grant for work at the Station. It was planned to purchase blue slate chippings for improving ground cover, provide a new large container for the area where the barrels had been removed, and fund re-planting/maintenance where needed. Northern Railway was to organise the management of the trees and overgrown vegetation on the car park side of the Station.

- **(b) SRA** Cllr Mrs Simpson reported that the SRA Committee was to give priority to determine design of the new build improvements; fund raising and services to the village. The financial position was sound. Repairs to a leak in the kitchen area and replacement of three doors had been undertaken.
- (c) Pond Resolved to arrange for the pond to be tidied, weed cleared and the removal of a dead branch from the tree on the island (proposed Cllr Poolford/seconded Cllr Sibley-Calder). It was decided not to accept an offer of iris plants.
- **22/210 Garden Allotments** It was noted £270.00 rent had been received to date. There was one vacant plot.
- **22/211 Gatehouse Lake** It was noted the Angling Club had refurbished 6 fishing pegs and cleared an area in the car park for an additional storage container.
- **22/212 Plant a Tree on The Green** the Council had received a request to plant a tree on the Green as a memorial. There was differing views expressed, some Councillors not wanting to create a precedent and to continue to preserve The Green and to manage the trees in line with the recent arboriculturist safety report, whilst others had empathy for such requests. It was suggested a policy be drawn up to help consider similar future requests. It was **Resolved** (by the Chairman's casting vote) to accept the request to plant the tree, but as a replacement tree only. It was not accepted to allow a plaque to be put with the tree (proposed Cllr Mrs Simpson/seconded Cllr Richardson).
- **22/213** Queens Canopy Woodland Area at the SRA Cllr Teare reported that the Humber Forest Project Officer had drafted a grant application and landowner agreement which would fund and manage the planting and maintaining of the trees to create the woodland project at the SRA. Humber Forest was awaiting a decision from Humber Archaeology and Ecology in order to finalise the documentation. It was Resolved to accept the way forward proposed by Humber Forest (proposed Cllr Alderton/seconded Cllr Swan).
- **22/214 Insurance Policy Resolved** to accept the three-year Long-Term Undertaking with Aviva Insurance, as recommended by BHIB Councils Insurance (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Alderton).
- **22/215 Works at Bethell's Bridge, Hempholme** Between November 2022 and the Summer of 2023, the Environment Agency plans to undertake construction work which consists of replacing the existing bridge over Rotsea Drain, and strengthening the

banks of the drain, both upstream and downstream of the bridge. This would stabilise the drain, preventing it from collapsing and so protecting the adjacent River Hull from damage. The works would require some major pieces of machinery being delivered to site – including a sheet-piling rig, in addition to the delivery of pre-cast concrete units and sheet piles that would also be transported via low-loader into the construction area.

The swing bridge at Bethell's Bridge which crosses The River Hull had a 7.5T weight limit, therefore all major machinery and materials delivery had to come in from the West. The proposed access route into the construction site was from the A164, along Hutton Balk, Church Street, Howl Lane and Rotsea Lane.

There would be an increase in traffic and larger vehicles passing through Hutton. The Environment Agency had confirmed all appropriate measures would be in place to ensure that any impacts are minimised, including the provision of a road sweeper, in case the condition of the roads worsen through the village.

22/216 Smaller Authorities' Audit Appointments (SAAA) – **Resolved** to remain in the central procurement and appointment scheme for the appointment of an external auditor for the period 2022-23 until 2026-27 (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Alderton).

22/217 Refurbishment of 20 mph Signs – **Resolved** to provide the East Riding of Yorkshire Council highways engineers with six new 20 mph signs designed by the schoolchildren (proposed Cllr Sibley-Calder/seconded Cllr Swan).

22/218 Dog fouling at the SRA – The Council had received complaints from users of the SRA about dog fouling on the field. It was suggested that restrictions on exercising dogs on the sports field should be considered. Cllr Mrs Simpson agreed to raise the matter with the SRA Committee

22/219 Skate Park at the SRA – A request for a skate park to be created at the SRA had been received by the Council. It was **Resolved** that the idea was considered not viable and a high safety risk (proposed Cllr Poolford/seconded Cllr Sibley-Calder). Cllr Mrs Simpson agreed to raise the matter with the SRA Committee.

22/220 Play Area – The weekly inspection log was noted. The repairs identified in the annual inspection report had been completed. A resident had suggested introducing a walking fitness trainer at the play area. It was **Resolved** it was not appropriate for adult fitness equipment at the children's play area (proposed Cllr Sibley-Calder/seconded Cllr Ingham). Cllr Mrs Simpson had explored the cost of outdoor fitness equipment and would seek the views of the SRA Committee.



There are plans to plant a 400 tree woodland at the Sports and Recreation Area in Hutton. This is being organised by the Parish Council with the Humber Forest.





I am currently undertaking the Duke of Edinburgh Award and as a part of the Bronze section, I must do an expedition. Wonderful churches in the East Riding

This is the first occasional article about the many fascinating churches in the East Riding. **St Mary's church** in the village of **Kirkburn** dates from the 12th century and has many special features, making it well worth a visit. It's only four miles from Cranswick as the crow flies and by bike is an easy ride on quiet lanes via Southburn. By car take the A614 from Driffield towards Bainton and turn right into Kirkburn two miles after the Kelleythorpe roundabout.



The church is entered through a spectacular doorway in the Romanesque style with five decorated semicircles above the door. On entering the nave, you are immediately struck by the steep open staircase leading up to the belfry. There are many other interesting features in the church which are well explained on a series of paddles provided for visitors. These include the 12th century decorated font, the impressive chancel arch and the intricately carved and decorated chancel screen. Outside some of the 19th century gravestones have their dates in Roman numerals, which may present the visitor with an interesting challenge.

The church is open every day from around 9am.


