## It's pleasing to report that 2023 started on a number of positive notes.

At the end of January volunteers turned out in force to plant some 500 trees at Gate House Lake beside the SRA. This formed part of the national Queen's Canopy initiative and was organised by the Parish Council in conjunction with Humber Forest.

A Burns Night celebration held at Foreman's Garage raised £1,750 for St Peter's church.

The Parish Council agreed to a feasibility study into installing a bandstand on the Green. This will include a survey of opinion in the village: see page 17.

A "February Frolic" was held at St Peter's church, with entertainment provided by village residents. Trish writes: "It was lovely to see so many people enjoying time together sharing food and entertainment. Who would have believed there was so much talent in Hutton Cranswick? We were treated to piano duets, violin and flute duets as well as solo performances, and three guitarists who sang a range of great songs. And interspersed between the music were a poet, a linguist in Yorkshire Dialect, and a budding tap dancer. Thank you to everyone who took part".

Local police were pleased to report that they had recovered a tractor worth £30,000 which had been stolen from a farm in East Yorkshire in January. This was thanks to a tracking device being installed: the police advise farmers to fit a tracker to all high-value mobile farm equipment.

Plans have now been published for events celebrating the King's Coronation weekend from Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> to Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May. The Coronation Service will take place on the morning of Saturday 6th at Westminster Abbey. On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> there will be a special Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle, which will be broadcast by the BBC. On the same day neighbours and communities are invited to share food and fun together in the Coronation "Big Lunch": residents may want to hold street parties as they did last year for the Queen's jubilee. There will be a Coronation Party at the SRA including a "have a go" event – more details will be published nearer the time. Monday 8th, a bank holiday, has been designated as the "Big Help Out", and will highlight the positive impact of volunteering. More details are awaited. Please remember that grants of upto £500 are available for appropriate projects – see page 17.

#### Voters will need photo ID

From May this year voters will need to show an approved form of photo identification. This could be a passport, driving licence, bus pass or blue badge. You can even use expired ID as long as the photograph still bears a strong resemblance. People who do not have any of these can now apply online for a free voter certificate as long as they are on the electoral register. They will need a current photo and their national insurance number. Alternatively they can register with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council for a postal vote.

#### **Yorkshire in Bloom Competition**

We have entered in the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) Yorkshire in Bloom competition 2023 in the Large Village Category. Judging will take place between the 1<sup>st</sup> – 16<sup>th</sup> July

2023. We are also inviting businesses and youth organisations to take part this year in their relevant categories. We will publicise participants in the April Bulletin.

#### Sustainability

Judges last year suggested that we should be encouraging residents and youth groups to plant more pollinator friendly plants throughout the village to attract bees, hover flies and other insects. If you would like to join in by planting pollinating plants here are a few suitable suggestions which you could try. It is by no means a comprehensive list and you may already have some of these in your gardens: Purple Salvia, Lavender, Sedums, Nepeta (Catmint), Herbs: Rosemary, Thyme, Marjoram, Alliums, Comfrey, Verbena Bonariensis, Honesty, Echinacea, Buddleias, Calendula, Marigold, Hardy Geraniums.

The *In Bloom* team will be putting this into practice as well in the containers and ground beds around the village. Therefore, rather than pick specific colours for the planting this year and building on the comments from the RHS

judges the team decided that the planting theme for this coronation year will be sustainability.

Sue has worked with Village In Bloom for many years and has helped the team with her knowledge of plants, how to propagate them and display them. 

#### Dexter and the Baby Dragons







#### Time to get walking again!

With Spring on its way we start to think about getting out to walk in the beautiful English countryside again, but where to find new and interesting walks?



The **Wold Rangers Way** is a challenging circular trail which winds its way 44 miles over the Yorkshire Wolds through amazing chalk landscapes with dry valleys with stunning wildlife alongside vibrant market towns and ancient Wolds villages. It also captures the unique history of the Wold Rangers and ensures that their names and stories live on forever. The Wold Rangers were around in the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries – men (and some women) who roamed the region living and working on the land in a nomadic way. They used to be a familiar sight camping out on the green lanes and chalk pits.

You don't have to do the whole 44 miles in one go! There are a number of circular walks covering the Way, ranging from 3.5 to 22 miles. These walks are described in a series of leaflets available from the Driffield Town Council office in Market Walk – they cost £7 for a pack of 8 or £1 each.

#### A circular walk round Beverley

- The starting point is the Leisure Centre on Flemingate. Leaving the Leisure Centre, turn right at the main entrance onto Flemingate. After 150 yards turn right onto Spark Mill Lane. Continue over the drain to a T junction, turning right along the track past Cherry Tree Cottage.
- Stay on the main track to cross the railway line with care and around further bends to reach Long Lane. Turn left along the road and on the bend by a house turn right into Willow Lane. Go past the caravan site and through a gate to reach a further gate at the housing estate.
- Turn left along the metalled path and stay on it where it bears right near a small copse (where the 10/13 mile routes leave the corner of the estate). After 300 yards, pass left of the play area and diagonally across the field to a gate onto Shepherd Lane.
- Turn right to cross Lincoln Way and straight on up the A164, Victoria Road. Turn right to cross with care at the traffic island, heading back towards town across the end of Normandy Avenue.
- At the white house turn left up the lane, then turn right opposite the playing field taking the footpath around the bottom of the quarry, turning left through gates into a field. Turn right to pass a small copse to reach a gate onto the Westwood.
- Go straight ahead to cross Walkington Road. After 50 yards turn right down the central grassy path towards the middle of the bottom fence. Pass through a gate and take the footpath alongside Minster School down to a corner of Ellerker Road. Turn right, then left down Central Avenue to cross The Leases and down to the main road.
- Cross with care to a triangular green and down Minster Moorgate, passing the Minster to reach Eastgate. Turn right and follow round into Flemingate and across the level crossing back to the Leisure Centre.

#### 23/002 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests: -

Cllr Mrs Simpson - Items 10(a)(b) Minutes 23/008(a)(b) – Non-pecuniary – In-Bloom Member/SRA Committee

**23/003 Minutes** – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 21<sup>st</sup> December, 2022, be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Ingham).

**23/004 Financial Monitoring** – (a) East Riding of Yorkshire Council had confirmed receipt of Hutton Cranswick Parish Council's precept demand form in the amount of £37,051.00 (b) the monitoring report, payments, receipts, variances, current account cashflow and bank statements and bank reconciliation (£111,023.41) as at month 10, were noted.

**23/005 Owl Box** – **Resolved** to accept the proposal from Cllr Kelly for a new post for the owl box to be installed at Centenary Wood in the sum of £50 (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Alderton).

**23/006 Footpath/Cycleway from Cranswick to Hutton (SRA)** – Two potential routes had been considered to date. The first starting at the railway station car park and following the boundary with the railway line crossing through two landowners' fields and coming out at the track at the gatehouse lake and through to Rotsea Lane. Cllr Thompson had made some initial enquiries with one of the landowners and Northern Rail.

The second started at Eddlemere Lane and followed the public right of way that came out at Howl Lane. East Riding of Yorkshire Council had some general observations of the route, recognising it would be a significant undertaking to achieve a paved, lit cycleway link between Cranswick and the SRA sports field. It was confirmed that one of the Powers of Parish Councils was to provide light and maintain footpaths and bridleways. Some key matters to consider included; landowner consent; legal agreements; user support; infrastructure cost (an indicative budget in the region of £150,000.00) and maintenance and energy costs.

Cllr Evison agreed to explore if any grant funding was available for the Project. Cllr Thompson agreed to consult with landowners.

- (c) 22/04058/VAR: Variation of Condition 6 (approved plans) of planning permission 17/03306/PLF (Retention and change of use of temporary building used as home office to holiday accommodation, including alterations and installation of flue) to allow the use of a shallow pitched roof rather than a flat roof at 95 Main Street, Hutton

Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QY – Variation of Condition – Resolved – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Ingham).

- (d) 22/04085/PLF: Erection of a storage shed in garden (Retrospective Application) at 95 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QY Full Planning Permission Resolved Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Ingham/seconded Cllr Swan).
- (e) 23/00041 HEDGE: Hedgerow removal and replanting along the A164, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire Hedgerow Removal Notice Resolved Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Thompson/seconded Cllr Swan).

#### 23/008 Representatives reports: -

(a) In Bloom – Cllr Mrs Simpson had circulated the annual Report for 2022 which was noted. The In Bloom team held its AGM followed by an Ordinary Meeting on the 23rd January, 2023. The vacancy of treasurer was appointed at the AGM. The Ordinary meeting was well attended, with new volunteers being introduced to established team members. The team was to enter the Yorkshire in Bloom Large Village Category and encourage other businesses to enter the competition. Network Rail had some general maintenance to complete at the Station. It was agreed that a reminder letter be sent to Network Rail, from the Parish Council, reminding them of the outstanding work (proposed Cllr Ingham/seconded Cllr Kelly).

Cllr Mrs Simpson circulated the revised "Welcome to Hutton Cranswick" leaflet. It was noted two broken leaflet holders were to be replaced.

(b) SRA – An update from Cllr Ingham was noted.

**23/009** The King's Coronation Community Fund — East Riding of Yorkshire Council had made available a grant fund to support communities across the East Riding, which planned to organise activities to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III in May 2023. The Event was promoted in the Driffield and Wolds Weekly, with volunteers welcome to come and help. The In Bloom Group was to give assistance. The SRA clubhouse would be available on the 30<sup>th</sup> January for refreshments.



Are you passionate about your community? Do you have innovative ideas and want to help to make change? Perhaps you have concerns about particular issues? People from all backgrounds who reflect their community are needed to put themselves forward to represent local residents.

Parish and town councils and councillors make a massive difference to the quality of life of local people. They are passionate about their communities and seek to make a change to help improve the lives of local residents. Local councils run numerous services, such as introducing solar panels, developing housing provision, establishing youth projects, managing allotments and open spaces, maintaining footpaths and so on.

Becoming a councillor is a rewarding experience as you will be able to make a change in your community. A councillor's role can include developing plans for the area, helping with problems and ideas, representing the community, working with community groups and talking to the community about their needs.

The main requirements are that you need to be over 18 and to have lived or worked in the ward or parish for at least 12 months. If there are more nominations than seats available, elections will be held on 4<sup>th</sup> May. If you are interested in becoming a councillor (either for the parish or ward) a good idea would be to talk to one of the existing councillors – see the list of parish councillors opposite. The final deadline for applications is 4<sup>th</sup> April 2023. 
