

East Riding of Yorkshire Council has given planning permission for National Grid's proposed Scotland to England Green Link (SEGL2) project. Once complete, the 68km underground onshore cable will run from Wilsthorpe, just south of Bridlington, to a new converter station and an existing substation at Drax Power Station. You can view the approved application and associated documents by visiting East Riding of Yorkshire Council's planning portal and inputting our application's reference number: 22/01990/STPLFE. If all of the project's planning applications are approved, construction should begin in autumn 2024 and finish in 2029.

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
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Sustainability - our theme for 2023

For example, have a word with your neighbours and agree on some plants suitable for pollinators to plant at the front and back of your houses so that they can complement each other. Village in Bloom Activity

On 17th March a Working Party of six volunteers spent two hours on tidying up the two entrance borders to the SRA. We made good progress, but there is still more to do. This is about tidying and clearing away weeds and dead plant material. If anyone feels they would like to join in at another time please get in touch with Gina Simpson or Heather Teare.

The In Bloom team is geared up to start identifying the areas around the village which have suffered in the summer drought and the winter cold and need to be improved and replanted. We will, no doubt, have lost some plants which will need to be replaced.

According to the latest reports on the environment we have had a dry winter and water may be in short supply again this summer. Please, if you are buying plants try to choose drought-resistant ones as much as possible.

Final comment

One of the newer members of the In Bloom team observed that 'surely In Bloom is about the whole village – not just the competition.' Something we need to bear in mind. Happy gardening.

What do you look forward to as we approach the Easter Weekend (which this year runs from Friday 7 - Monday 10 April)...? I have to admit that I've a bit of a weakness for hot cross buns, which you can already buy in

local shops. Apparently M&S are doing a "banoffee" hot cross bun this year - a bit over the top for me...!

This Easter is going to be the first Easter I have ever celebrated without my Dad, who sadly died at the end of February. His funeral is in the week running up to the Easter Weekend.

There's a mixture of sadness and happiness as I write this article. Sadness because I miss my Dad, with all of his funny ways (some of which, no doubt, I've inherited!).

But the message of Easter brings me happiness, despite the sadness of our family's loss. The cross on the hot cross bun reminds us that Jesus died on a cross that first Easter weekend (that's why "Good Friday" is called *Good* Friday). But the cross has also become a symbol of hope because of what happened the following Sunday, the first "Easter Sunday."

On that first Easter Sunday morning, friends of Jesus went to his graveside to remember him. But they found no body. At first they were deeply upset, as anyone would be to experience such a shocking discovery. The comfort of visiting a loved one's grave is one of the few comforts available to us in a time of grief, which makes churchyards such special places for so many of us.

However, the missing body in the Easter story is not the end of the story. For on that day, in the days to come, Jesus' friends and family began to experience a second shock – the shock of seeing the risen Jesus, alive and well, eating and drinking, talking and listening to them, just as He always had.

My Dad shared in the hope and faith of Easter. He believed – as I do – that because of Jesus' death on the cross for us, there is the hope of forgiveness and eternal life for all who put their faith and hope in Him.

May I wish those of you who have recently lost loved ones the comfort of God's loving presence this Easter. And those of you who have yet to experience such loss, may you experience (maybe for the first time) the joy of Jesus' resurrection...

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
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Hutton Cranswick Parish Council

Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 22nd February, 2023. The meeting was held at the WI Hall, Main Street, Cranswick and commenced at 7.00 pm.

Present: Councillors: Alderton, Holtby, Kelly, Poolford, Richardson (in the Chair), Sibley-Calder, Mrs Simpson, Swan, Teare, Thompson. Ward Councillor: Evison. KCOM: 2; Community Speed Watch Coordinator: 1. The Clerk recorded the minutes.

23/024 Apologies: Councillors: Ingham, Lock, Wilkinson. Ward Councillor: Dewhirst.

23/025 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests: -

Cllr Mrs Simpson - Items 10(a)(b) Minutes 23/032(a)(b) - Non-pecuniary - In-Bloom Member/SRA Committee.

Cllr Mrs Simpson - Item 14 Minute 23/036 - Non-pecuniary - In-Bloom Member.

Cllr Thompson - Item 9(a) Minute 23/031(a) - Non-pecuniary - Family Member of Scurf Dyke Farm.

23/026 Minutes – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 25th January, 2023, be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Alderton).

23/027 Financial Monitoring – The monitoring report, payments, receipts, variances, current account cashflow and bank statements and bank reconciliation (£110,081.94) as at month 11, were noted.

23/028 KCOM – Representatives from KCOM gave an overview of the future installation programme for the village and, in particular, outlined the extent of the works to be undertaken on The Green covered by the proposed Wayleave considered at the last meeting. KCOM recognised the importance to cause minimum disruption and reinstate any damage done to The Green. The Chairman thanked KCOM for their attendance.

It was **Resolved** to permit the installation of KCOM apparatus and the Clerk sign the Wayleave, as presented (proposed Cllr Poolford/seconded Cllr Swan).

23/029 Parish Elections on the 4th **May, 2023** – Guidance on the election process received from East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Electoral Services Manager was noted. The guidance was published in The Bulletin and was to be posted on social media.

23/030 Planning Matters – The following decisions were noted:

- (a) 22/03886/PLF: Erection of a single storey extension to the rear, following removal of existing conservatory at 57 Laburnum Avenue, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QH Full Planning Permission Granted 4 Conditions.
- **(b) 22/03995/PLF**: Erection of extension to house new biomass boiler with associated plant and silo, following removal of three existing biomass boilers, plant, silo and associated housings at Dignity Manufacturing Production, Unit 1, Cranswick Industrial Estate, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QE Full Planning Permission Granted 2 Conditions.
- (c) 22/03997/PLF: Erection of extension to house new biomass boiler with associated plant and silo, following removal of two existing biomass boilers, plant, silo and associated housings at Dignity Manufacturing Production, Unit 2, Cranswick Industrial Estate, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QE Full Planning Permission Granted 2 Conditions.

23/031 Planning Applications:

- (a) 22/03995/PLF: Erection of extension to house new biomass boiler with associated plant and silo, following removal of three existing biomass boilers, plant, silo and associated housings at Dignity Manufacturing Production, <u>Unit 1</u>, Cranswick Industrial Estate, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QE Full Planning Permission Resolved Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Poolford).
- (b) 23/00049/STVAR: Variation of Condition 6 (planting) and Condition 11 (approved plans) of planning application 22/01822/STVAR Variation of Condition 6 (hedgerows), Condition 9 (foul and surface water drainage) and Condition 11 (approved plans) of planning permission 21/03060/STVAR (Variation of Condition 10 (approved plans) of planning permission 19/04321/STPLF Construction of a solar farm and battery storage facility, together with all associated works, equipment and necessary infrastructure) at Land North East of Eastfield Farm, Stockbridge Lane, Cranswick, East Riding of

Yorkshire, YO25 9RB – Strategic – Variation of Conditions – **Resolved** – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Poolford).

(c) 22/02539/STPLF: Hybrid application consisting of: (a) Full planning permission for the erection of fuel filling station (sui generis), erection of a commercial unit (B8 use), extension and external alterations to two agricultural buildings to allow use as commercial units (E and B8 uses respectively), erection of visitor centre with café and educational space (sui generis) with associated access and parking, (b) Outline erection of drive-thru restaurant (sui generis/E uses) with associated parking (all matters reserved), following demolition of existing buildings at Kelleythorpe Farm, Driffield Road, Kelleythorpe, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9DW – Strategic – Full Planning Permission. Following considerable debate, it was **Resolved** – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Poolford).

23/032 Representatives reports: -

(a) In Bloom – The Village had entered the annual Yorkshire in Bloom Competition for 2023 in the Large Village Category with judging planned between 1st and 16th July, 2023. Other village businesses and youth organisations had been encouraged to enter into their relevant categories.

The Bulletin has an article encouraging would-be community participants to consider planting more pollinator-friendly plants to encourage bees, hover flies and other insects, as recommended by last year's judges.

The Coronation planting theme was to be sustainability.

A new Treasurer had been appointed.

There was an opportunity for volunteers to plant up and maintain two areas of the village – the tubs outside the Club House at SRA and the four rectangular metal containers in Hutton Road. A working party planned to clear and re-plant where necessary the entrance beds to the SRA car park.

Northern Rail and Network Rail had commenced maintenance work at the Station. Support from volunteers from Hymers College through the Yorkshire Coast Community Rail Partnership was to be available later in the year. A grant from Northern Rail would be used to lay blue slate chippings in the areas currently covered by old gravel and make an improvement to the background of the platform areas.

(b) SRA – A decision to put in place a 99-year Lease (ending on 11th January, 2094) was to be actioned by the Clerk. A reply from the Archery club about a concern raised by the Angling Club was noted.

The SRA Committee had been awarded a conditional grant of £16,100.00 from The Sandsfield Community Fund (SCF) towards replacing floodlighting. One of the criteria of the SCF was that the applicant had to have a donation of around 10% of the cost from a Contributing Third-Party. At the October meeting, the Parish Council agreed to act as the Contributing Third-Party and provide a grant to a maximum of £1,600.00. The SRA had confirmed the Contributing Third Party (CTP) amount required had slightly increased to £1,797.00.

It was **Resolved** (a) To accept the completed Grantscape Contributing Third Party (CPT) Donation Form and (b) to increase the donation from the Parish Council to £1797.00 (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Sibley-Calder).

- (c) Pond Some clearing of the pond weed and cutting back of bushes had been undertaken. It was agreed that Cllr Sibley-Calder would inspect the deeper areas of the pond and if necessary, the Clerk would arrange for any additional work to be carried out (proposed Cllr Sibley-Calder/seconded Cllr Thompson).
- It was noted the tree lights would be turned off at the end of the month.
- (d) Village Show Cllr Teare reported that an application for Hutton Cranswick Village Show to be registered as a Charity, was being considered by the Charity Commission. The Show was self-financing and currently had a reasonable level of funds. The Show was to be held on the 22nd July, 2023; full details had been published in the March Edition of The Bulletin.
- **23/033 Footpath/Cycleway from Cranswick to Hutton (SRA)** Cllr Evison had provided details of potential grant funding opportunities through the Shared Prosperity levelling up funding received by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and the additional Rural England Funds. Cllr Thompson had inspected the two potential routes and was to undertake further consultations regarding permissions required for each option.
- **23/034** The King's Coronation Community Fund It was noted that the East Riding of Yorkshire Council 'King's Coronation Community Fund' for Town and Parish Councils in the East Riding had opened for applications on the 1st February, 2023.
- **23/035** East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Street Trading and Collections licensing policy The Council had no comments on the proposed alterations to the Policy, at present.

23/036 Village in Bloom – **Resolved** – To grant a request from the In-Bloom Team for the annual grant of £1200.00 (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Swan).

23/037 Gatehouse Lake Angling Club – **Resolved** – To grant permission to the Angling Club to undertake Phase 2 of the fishing peg renewal programme (proposed Cllr Thompson/seconded Cllr Alderton).

23/038 Methodist Church – The Council had received a request from the Methodist Church for a donation towards the cost of some improvements and maintenance works to the Chapel Hall. It was noted that local councils are prevented from contributing to such costs under the provisions of the Local Government Act 1894. It was **Resolved** not to make a donation (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Thompson).

23/039 Community Emergency Plan – It was **Resolved** to complete the questionnaire received from the Humber Emergency Planning Service, who would use that information to produce a 'plan on a page' for Hutton Cranswick (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Alderton).

23/040 Play Area – Resolved that the annual playground inspection was to be done alongside East Riding of Yorkshire Council's inspections, arranged for April, 2023 (proposed Cllr Thompson/seconded Cllr Poolford).

Wonderful churches of the East Riding

St. Oswald's church in **Flamborough** has several unusual features and is well worth a visit. Arriving at the village from the Bridlington direction, the church is clearly visible on the right. A few yards further on, the church car park is through the entrance on the left hand side of the road.

The church was built over the period 1150 to 1300, though the tower is much more recent. St. Oswald is the patron saint of fishermen – themes of the sea and fishing are to be found in the stained glass windows and some of the other fittings, reflecting the main occupation of local residents over the years.



The church interior is dominated by the magnificent carved rood loft, situated above the rood screen between the nave and the chancel. The term "rood" comes from the Great Rood, the cross which would normally be mounted above the screen. Rood lofts are now quite rare in parish churches; this one was relocated from Bridlington Priory after the dissolution of the monasteries in the 16th century.

A unique feature of the church is the "Flamborough Book of Service". This consists of 26 oak-framed panels which tell the story of local people in World War 2. It lists members of not just the armed forces, but air raid wardens, special constables, the home guard etc.



St. Oswald's is open daily from approximately 9am to 4pm. There is a communion service at 10.30am every Thursday as well as on Sunday.

These irresponsible dog owners also seem to think that the network of public footpaths and open fields surrounding the village can also be used for their dogs' toilet. This is not acceptable.

The greater number of residents really take great pride in our village, and the volunteers of the Village in Bloom Group put a lot of effort into the floral and colourful offering around the whole village. Can that small minority of dog owners who are guilty of allowing their dogs to foul public areas, (and they know who they are), please, please, take a pride in your village.


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

Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Bandstand

On the 8th of September 2022, the world stood still as the news of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II's passing was broadcast across TV and radio stations worldwide. In honour of the incredible life of Queen Elizabeth II, we offer a tribute of our gratitude and admiration of her Majesty.

Plans are being put forward for a bandstand to be erected in Hutton Cranswick to serve as a lasting memory to Her Late Majesty as well as being a valuable community facility and focal point for the village. It is hoped the stand could be used for musical and entertainment events across the year.

We have come up with a simple design for an outdoor stand. The initial design is based on a heptagon (seven sides to reflect the 70 years reign). Space on the seven sided stand and its wrought iron fencing would create design opportunities to remember key parts of the 70 year reign of Queen Elizabeth II.

The stand is 5 metres in diameter. It would have storage underneath the performance area for up to 40 chairs and three tables. It would have electricity and broadband connection. There would be lighting under the canopy. We shared our plans and showed the model at a recent market. There was a lot of support for the idea.

We have now approached the Parish Council and agreed to undertake a feasibility study on placing a Bandstand on the Green. The feasibility study would include a survey of opinion



in the village, an investigation into the planning and statutory requirements, the design and cost of such a structure. With this information the Parish Council would be better placed to make a decision in the future on the appropriateness of such a structure being placed on the Green. We envisage the feasibility study will take about four months to complete.

We are seeking a number of volunteers to join a Community Speed Watch Scheme in this area.

Could you spare two hours a month?

All training and equipment is provided free of charge.

Anyone between 18 and 80 can take part.

This is an opportunity to make a difference in your community.

This initiative is administered by Humberside Police with the full support of Hutton Cranswick Parish Council.

Community Speed Watch - F.A.Qs.

What are the minimum requirements to form a team?

A CSW team needs a minimum of 6 people, this allows for holidays, illness and work commitments. Within the team there must be a designated team coordinator as a SPOC for the team, they are responsible for organising the monitoring sessions and looking after the equipment.

How much time must I commit to be part of a team?

You can complete a monitoring session for as long as you want and as often as you want. All we ask is each team member gives 2 hours a month as a minimum. Each session is for as long as 3 trained members are present.

How do I get trained and how long does it take?

Training is completed in 2 parts. First a 1 hour power point presentation followed by a roadside training session of around 20 minutes. They do not have to be done on the same day.

Do we have a Police Officer with us when we do the monitoring? Community Speed Watch is run entirely by volunteers. The scheme is supported by Humberside Police but they will not normally be

present when you conduct your monitoring sessions. How much does it cost to join Community Speed Watch?

Community Speed Watch is free to become a volunteer. The equipment required to carry out CSW will either be provided on a loan basis or details of the preferred suppliers will be available for councils to purchase their own equipment.

How is the information from Community Speed Watch recorded and used?

Whilst monitoring vehicles at the roadside the team will record the details of speeding vehicles on a spreadsheet. This information is then inputted into a computer system and emailed to the scheme coordinator. The information is checked against the Police National Computer (PNC) for the keepers details, from which warning letters are then sent. The information is retained for a 12 month rolling period by the police.

Can we stand anywhere to 'catch' speeding vehicles?

Community Speed Watch is an educational tool and as such is aimed at altering driver behaviour rather than issuing fines and points. For that reason sites are selected that offer the greatest amount of visibility of the team to vehicles. Once the vehicle driver sees the team 99% of the time they instinctively slow down.


