



Ian and I have lived in Hutton Cranswick for well over three years now and we have no plans to move again. We love it here. It is a very beautiful village with the green, centenary wood, fields and amenities but that is not the reason we want to stay. The best thing about this village is the people. Everyone has been very welcoming from the start and, although our first experience of meeting people at the church was on zoom, we very soon felt part of that family.

Feeling welcomed, included and valued is, I suspect, the most important thing in life for most people. I am a Christian simply because Jesus is to me the best example of how to live a good life. He was a master at spotting people who had been isolated by their community and, in a few minutes managed to make the beggar, leper, tax collector, Samaritan woman and prostitute, amongst others, feel valued and important. Jesus taught that we are all equally important to God but we need to value and care for each other too.

This morning I met a lady who felt she was not welcome in our church because she was not christened in the Church of England. This made me very sad. Church is not a club for which you need certain criteria to belong - everyone is welcome regardless of age, gender, background, colour, beliefs, sexuality, or any other feature you can think of that people use to categorise themselves. We are all unique but our desire to connect with others, to be loved and to live a life of peace and happiness is what connects us, regardless of our differences.

On Easter Sunday there were well over 100 people in church (including over 20 children and 3 dogs!) all celebrating and sharing lunch, conversation and Easter eggs!

I sincerely hope that everyone there felt welcome, because you were and you are. The Bible teaches us that God made us all, so please don't ever let anyone convince you that you are not welcome or worthy to be anywhere, least of all in church - a place in which people have prayed to, and felt connected with, God for hundreds of years.

St Peter's church is now open every day. Please do go in whenever you like and, if there is no-one there, know that God is there. If you have any specific worries please write them on a prayer card and one or more of the ministry team will pray for you or with you. People will definitely be there on Thursdays this month (community café) and every Sunday morning of course so please do come back then and, if we haven't yet done so, let us give you a warm welcome in person.




Adventure at Jump City





Hutton Cranswick Parish Council

Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 22nd March, 2023. The meeting was held at the WI Hall, Main Street, Cranswick and commenced at 7.00 pm.

Present: Councillors: Holtby, Ingham, Kelly, Poolford, Richardson (in the Chair), Sibley-Calder, Swan, Teare, Thompson. Parishioners: Two. The Clerk recorded the minutes.

23/051 Apologies: Councillors: Alderton, Lock, Mrs Simpson, Wilkinson. Ward Councillors: Dewhirst, Evison.

23/052 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests: -

Cllr Ingham Items 10(b)/17 - Minutes 23/059(a)/66 - Non-pecuniary - SRA Committee.

Cllr Teare Item 14 Minute 23/059 Non-pecuniary – Bulletin Team Member.

23/053 Minutes – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 22nd February, 2023, be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Poolford/seconded Cllr Swan).

23/054 Month 12 Financial Monitoring: -

(a) Section 137 – Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972 enables local councils to spend a limited amount of money for purposes for which they have no other specific statutory expenditure. It has to be in the interests of, and will bring direct benefit to, the area or any part of it, or all or some of its residents.

The amount of money was calculated by multiplying 'the appropriate Sum' per elector, by the number of persons on the electoral roll for the parish as at the 1st April, 2023.

Section 137 expenditure had to be contained within the Council's budget.

It was noted that the Council had remained within its limit for 2022-23.

The 'appropriate Sum' for 2023-24 was £9.93 per elector.

The amount of money for 2023-24 was to be reported to the Annual Meeting of the Council.

- (b) The monitoring report, a list of all payments, receipts, variances, payments to the Clerk, were noted.
- (c) The bank account statements and a bank reconciliation (£106,757.61) were noted. The bank statement and bank reconciliation were verified and signed by Cllr Teare, being a member other than the Chairman and cheque signatory.
- (d) A claim to recover VAT from HMRC, in the sum of £2,619.01, was noted.
- (e) A review of the 2023-24 Budget was noted. A proposal to share the £500.00 provision allocated to support events to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III to, the Events at the SRA (£250.00) and the Ring for The King Event (£250.00) was accepted (proposed Cllr Teare/seconded Cllr Thompson).

23/055 Reserves – The Clerk proposed a level of Reserves based on the estimated bank balances at the end of March, 2023, the 2022-23 budget outturn, a review of the 2023-24 budget and previously identified Reserves. £25,800.00 remained unallocated. A suggestion of including a provision for the support of the new build at the SRA was considered. However, until there was a firm financial plan for the proposal at the SRA the Council was unable to make a commitment to the Project. It was noted that a fully costed scheme was being prepared for the proposal based on plans submitted with the current planning application. A suggestion to increase the allocation for the footpath/cycle way from Cranswick to the SRA by the £25,800.00 was agreed.

It was **Resolved** to approve the following level of Reserves: -

Any adjustment required as a result of year end bank balances, would be applied to the General Reserve (proposed Cllr Sibley-Calder/seconded Cllr Swan).

23/056 Parish Elections on the 4th May, 2023 – Two Notice of Elections (a) East Riding of Yorkshire Council Ward Notice of Election and (b) East Riding Parishes Notice of Election had been published on the website and noticeboards.

23/057 Planning Matters – The following decisions were noted:

- (a) 22/04085/PLF: Erection of a storage shed in garden (Retrospective Application) at 95 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QY Full Planning Permission Granted 3 Conditions.
- **(b) 22/00460/PLF**: Erection of a detached dwelling and double garage, following demolition of existing workshop (AMENDED DESCRIPTION AND PLANS) at 18 Orchard Lane, Hutton, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9PZ Full Planning Permission Permission Refused Appeal Dismissed.
- (c) 22/00994/PLF: Erection of a building to form 2 industrial units, installation of 2 floodlights mounted on 7m high columns and 6 wall mounted floodlights and associated hardstanding/parking areas and drainage works at Land East of North Humberside Precision Engineers, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QE Full Planning Permission Granted 8 Conditions.
- (d) 22/01990/STPLFE: Construction of sub-surface cable route from Drax Power Station to Fraisthorpe Coastline with associated accesses and temporary construction compounds, in association with the Scotland to England Green Link Cross Country Cable Route from Drax Power Station to Fraisthorpe Coastline, Bridlington Road, Fraisthorpe, East Riding of Yorkshire Strategic Full Planning Permission with EIA Permission Granted 22 Conditions.
- (e) 22/11055/PPA: the replacement of fencing and hedge cutting at Centenary Wood, Hutton Road, Hutton Cranswick will not require Planning Permission or Building Regulation Approval 2 Conditions.

23/058 Planning Applications:

(a) 22/03963/PLF: Erection of an extension to existing building and installation of 2 roof lights at Hutton Cranswick Sports and Recreation Association, Hutton Cranswick Sports Field, Rotsea Lane, Hutton, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9ES – Full Planning Permission - Resolved – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Ingham).

23/059 Representatives reports: -

- (a) SRA Cllr Ingham reported; the kitchen refurbishment was complete; the plans to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III was progressing well; fundraising for the new build was ongoing, with the fundraising committee preparing a Lottery Bid and seeking sponsorship from local companies.
- **(b) Pond** Cllr Sibley-Calder had been reassured about the current state of the pond and would monitor for any changes during the next few months.
- (c) BT Box on The Green Cllr Sibley-Calder was planning to start refurbishing the BT Box later in the year.

23/060 Supplemental Lease for the SRA – **Resolved** – To accept the Lease, as presented and that the Chairman and Clerk sign the Lease on behalf of the Parish Council (proposed Cllr Thompson/seconded Cllr Sibley-Calder).

23/061 Website Maintenance and Support for 2023 – **Resolved** – To accept the £20.00 increase in the cost of the Events Calendar applications (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Ingham).


ARE YOU A JOHNSON? YOU MIGHT HAVE RELATIVES IN CANADA


In 1749, Christopher Johnson was born in Hutton Cranswick. He died 1829. His parents may have been John and Ann Walker (b 1717). He may have married Ann **Peckston** October 30, 1768 at Great Driffield. There are many Christopher Johnson's and it's difficult to keep the line straight.

For sure Christopher had 11 children and the seventh, William christened June 3, 1781, is my direct ancestor. William was the only son to survive to adulthood.




William moved to Weaverthorpe sometime before 1801 and worked as a "wright". Since this is a skill to be acquired, it makes sense that he learned this in Hutton Cranswick, perhaps from his father.

In 1801 he married Mary <u>Ireland</u>. William and Mary had 12 children. Mary died the same year that their last child was born in 1824, perhaps in childbirth.



Church warden accounts (Weaverthorpe) show William working for pay on church repairs from 1805 through 1828. It is probable that he began to make plans to emigrate to Canada about the time his father was dying. He likely moved back to Hutton Cranswick around 1828 to be near his mother.

In 1827 William married Elles **Robson**. They had 11 children, some born in Weaverthorpe, some in Canada.





In 1832 William and Elles and eight children sailed from Yorkshire to Canada. Five of the children were from William's marriage to Mary Ireland and three were from his marriage to Elles Robson.

The family first settled near what is now Toronto. Later they moved to a farming community near Hamilton, Ontario named Binbrook. My mother was born there.

William died October 28, 1852. He was buried in the Knox Presbyterian Cemetery in Binbrook. We don't know why there is a "T" in his name on the stone.

I don't have a picture of Elles' tombstone, don't know why because I'm only about $\frac{1}{2}$ hour away from the cemetery.

In celebration of the 1832 immigration, the family planned a reunion for 1932. 230 members of the family were present which actually took place in Hamilton Ontario 1933.

In 2004, the current family held a reunion on July 31. The event took place at the Agricultural Hall on the Binbrook Fairgrounds (Highway #56 Binbrook).

We are seeking a number of volunteers to join a Community Speed Watch Scheme in this area.

Could you spare two hours a month?

All training and equipment is provided free of charge.

Anyone between 18 and 80 can take part.

This is an opportunity to make a difference in your community.

This initiative is administered by Humberside Police with the full support of Hutton Cranswick Parish Council.

Community Speed Watch - F.A.Qs.

What are the minimum requirements to form a team?

A CSW team needs a minimum of 6 people, this allows for holidays, illness and work commitments. Within the team there must be a designated team coordinator as a SPOC for the team, they are responsible for organising the monitoring sessions and looking after the equipment.

How much time must I commit to be part of a team? You can complete a monitoring session for as long as you want and as often as you want. All we ask is each team member gives 2 hours a month as a minimum. Each session is for as long as 3 trained members are present. How do I get trained and how long does it take? Training is completed in 2 parts. First a 1 hour power point presentation followed by a roadside training session of around 20 minutes. They do not have to be done on the same day.

Do we have a Police Officer with us when we do the monitoring? Community Speed Watch is run entirely by volunteers. The scheme is supported by Humberside Police but they will not normally be present when you conduct your monitoring sessions.

How much does it cost to join Community Speed Watch?

Community Speed Watch is free to become a volunteer. The equipment required to carry out CSW will either be provided on a loan basis or details of the preferred suppliers will be available for councils to purchase their own equipment

How is the information from Community Speed Watch recorded and used?

Whilst monitoring vehicles at the roadside the team will record the details of speeding vehicles on a spreadsheet. This information is then inputted into a computer system and emailed to the scheme coordinator. The information is checked against the Police National Computer (PNC) for the keepers details, from which warning letters are then sent. The information is retained for a 12 month rolling period by the police.

Can we stand anywhere to 'catch' speeding vehicles?

Community Speed Watch is an educational tool and as such is aimed at altering driver behaviour rather than issuing fines and points. For that reason sites are selected that offer the greatest amount of visibility of the team to vehicles. Once the vehicle driver sees the team 99% of the time they instinctively slow down.





Training for the London Marathon . . .

As a villager I thought I would let you know what I've been up to. Many of you I have passed on my runs around the village often conscious of my bright red face, sweaty and often unable to grunt more than a quick Hi. I was lucky enough to win a ballot place and I've been training for the London Marathon since January on a 16 wk plan.

Training has gone well, I've been following my plan and all my long runs are now done, including several 18 and 20 mile runs. I'm tapering now so I'm rested and ready for the big day on the 23rd of April.

I have clocked up over 450 miles since January. It has not been easy having only ever done 1 half marathon. I first started running around 4 or 5 years ago instead of watching my son run his races while drinking, eating cake and chatting to the other parents. Often moaning about being overweight and needing to lose weight, I decided to join in.

At first I struggled having not run or even gone to the gym since being at school around 25 years ago. I adopted a technique of running to a lamppost then had to walk to the next to recover, gradually I built it up to starting to do several 10 k races but never imagined I would ever run a marathon!

I've been enjoying the long runs as I have a good friend who joins me and we often run around Thixendale, Millington and along the coastal paths often getting lost. We have found some lovely trails but with the beauty of the scenery comes some challenging hills. I'm training harder on the hope that flat London will be easier.

Within my plan there have been many 6 or 8 mile mid week runs, these have been a real challenge with not finishing work until 6.00 pm and dashing home to cook tea. I often don't get out until 9.00 pm after eating and catching up with the kids. In the cold and dark I've really had to push myself out of the door to run several laps of Hutton and Cranswick to get the mileage in with few street lights and no one around. Its been a bit lonely at times but some good running friends from two local clubs have often joined me to keep me going.



Would you spend 30 minutes of your time to save a life?



Secondly, a colleague seems withdrawn and different and thirdly a family member seems exceptionally stressed and unhappy. The advice was clear and helpful and, while I may look for more detail, for now I feel more confident to discuss such serious feelings in a compassionate but direct manner.


