Memories! We all have them. Some good, perhaps about holidays, special events and celebrations, memorable meals, times with family, times with friends and some bad.

What do we do with memories?

Do we hoard them up and never bring them out & dust them off? Or simply forget about them!

The older we become, the easier it is to forget even though we don't want to.

I have many lovely memories of times with Mum & Dad, other family members, times with friends, holidays etc. The more I think about the 'good', the more I can remember. Every so often, I like to 'dust them off' and reminisce. It helps keep the memories 'alive'.

What about our 'bad' memories? Do we try to forget about them or perhaps try to learn from them?

Scrap books used to be all the rage in the 50s & 60s but they don't seem as popular these days.

What are scrap books, I hear you say?

They used to be foolscap size – A4 today – and they might be filled with photos of pop stars, or film stars, from the daily newspapers. They might be 'holiday' scrapbooks, just containing photos or comments from holidays with family or friends. (Many people didn't have cameras in those days, so keeping a written record was important; the only phone was the 'house' phone, and not everyone had one.)

When I was little, Mum, Dad, my 2 older brothers & myself, would have 2 weeks' holiday in a 'Boarding House' at Scarborough. We didn't have a car but Scarborough was on the train line from Leeds.

The first thing Dad did, after leaving our luggage at the Boarding House, was buy us all 'pack-a-macs': black plastic rain coats. Why? Because it usually rained sometime in our 2 weeks' holiday (sometimes every day!) & Dad wanted us to be prepared. They cost 50p in new money and they lasted us not just for our holiday but for the whole year.

I have wonderful memories of those times: swimming in the sea, walking along the Marine Drive, visiting the Corner Café, having sandwiches on the beach for lunch and sand getting everywhere!

How times have changed. Now I have wonderful memories of visiting Israel & Turkey from when I was teaching, Italy once I'd retired as well as Northumberland. David & I did a lot of 'back backing' (carrying food, tent, etc) in Wales, Scotland & the Lake District. A friend and I had two wonderful cycling holidays in Suffolk and then another friend joined us for the third.

Every so often, we get the 'feel good' factor from reminiscing. Memories are so important to all of us. Hopefully, we learn from our 'bad' memories, so we don't keep repeating the same mistakes!


The good memories continue to give pleasure down through the years & decades. Now that so many have a camera on their mobile, we have our photographic memories as well.

THE CROSSING

A short story by local author James Noble

Perhaps the English were ready and waiting, and there were many rumours of the fierce Britons who would go to any lengths to defend their shores, and send invaders back from where they came. But there were many in the boats, probably too many for the English to stop, especially as it appeared that defences were limited at that time.

Then came the day. The clouds allowed the sun through as dawn broke, and the waves that had once crashed upon the sandy shores of the French coast eased. Many hands pushed the boats into the shallows, and the embarkation began, an armada that set out, using those white cliffs for a guide to confront the English, and whatever that might bring.

Few had any concerns for those who only wished to live their lives peacefully and without confrontation across the channel, for the die was cast and the desires of those in the boats were now paramount. Whatever they could take, they would take, and damn the English.

The boats made their progress and the white cliffs became higher as they closed with the opposite shore. Excitement increased as they saw no defences awaiting them. Soon, the pebbles would crunch beneath their feet and they would advance, spreading out over the southern coast. The first boat neared the shore, and they prepared themselves. He in the bow leapt into the waves and waded ashore, but once on the land he tripped and fell. Feeling this to be a bad omen, he kissed the stones and looked back at those who waited in the boats. He beckoned the others to follow him to their destiny. Duke William of Normandy had come to take England from the English, and a crown from Harold, the King.

Book review



"Old God's Time" by Sebastian Barry

Barry's latest novel deals with the grim legacy of childhood sexual abuse in Irish Catholic institutions and does so with both deep sadness and humour. Tom is a survivor, of children's homes and then the army, mourning the loss of his wife, lonely without his children but still with a great love for humanity. Barry is a poet and the language of this story makes it feel almost miraculous. His imagery is both beautiful and surprising, illuminating Tom's inner world so that the reader enters fully into his experience. There are unexpected revelations throughout the book and the reader is left not quite knowing what is true, what is imagined and what, perhaps is in between. The ending is both surprising and powerful.

Melissa Harrison, in her review in the Guardian, writes, 'It is hard to unravel the "true" story of what Tom has experienced, and this is entirely cognate with the corroding effects of trauma on memory'. The trauma that both Tom and his wife June were left with has damaged their children, too, in spite of the fierce, protective love they both had for them.

All Barry's novels are wonders of both language and plot. My favourite remains 'The Secret Scripture' which was made into an excellent film. His other novels include: 'The Whereabouts of Eneas McNulty', 'Annie Dunne', 'On Canaan's Side', 'Days Without End' and 'A Thousand Moons'. The reader is enriched by his ability to enter the inner lives of his characters with empathy and love, enlarging our own understanding.
