HUTTON CRANSWICK PARISH COUNCIL Extract from the minutes of the meeting held on 22 November, 2023.



23/262 East Riding Local Plan Update Examination Hearing 15th **November 2023**. As part of Matter 13 (Allocations in Rural Service Centres and Primary Villages) the Inspector agreed with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's proposed modification to the allocation CRA-F in Hutton Cranswick (land to the south of Hobman Lane). The Inspector's report should be published by East Riding of Yorkshire in due course.

At the Hearing, the Inspector was informed that a planning application had been submitted in relation to CRA-F (21 /03827 /STPLF) and reference was made to a layout plan in way of explanation to the proposed modification to land described as buffer. The Case Officer was to be asked to confirm the status of the application.

23/263 National Joint Council for Local Government Services (NJC) Pay Scales — Resolved (a) to adopt the new pay scales for 2023-24 and (b) to notify Autela Payroll Services that the back pay was to be paid in even amounts over the remaining 4 months of the financial year ending March, 2024.

23/264 Planning Matters — The following decisions were noted:

- 23/02890/TCA: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Crown lift 1 No. (TI) Sycamore tree to 5m; Dismantle 1 No. Purple Leaved Maple (T2) to ground level; Crown lift 1 No. (T3) Mature Ash Tree to 6m; Crown lift 1 No. (T4) Silver Birch tree to 5m at 14 Orchard Lane, Hutton Tree Works in Conservation Area No Objections Raised.
- 23/02987 /TCA: HUTTON CRANSWICK CONSERVATION AREA Fell 1 No. Cherry tree (TI) and Fell 1 No. Lime tree (T2), as the trees have outgrown location and are now damaging the wall and driveway at Greenlands, The Green, Hutton Cranswick— Tree Works in Conservation Area No Objections Raised.

23/265 Planning Applications:

- 23/03028/PLF: Change of use of land for the siting of 4 glamping pods with hardstanding and associated works at Land South of Highfield Farm, Southburn Road, Hutton Cranswick Full Planning Permission Resolved Not to object to the application.
- 23/03132/VAR: Variation of Condition 13 (approved plans) of planning permission 21 / 04678/VAR Variation of condition 15 (approved plans) of planning permission 18/00455/PLF (Erection of 16 dwellings with associated garages and infrastructure), to allow change in garage design for plots 6,7 & 8 and attached garages for plots 10 & 1 1), to allow the increase of roof height over garage and installation of a window to rear for Plots 10 and 11 at Land and Buildings Rear of 99 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick Variation to Condition Resolved Not to object to the application.
- 23/03463/TPO HUTTON VILLAGE 1973 (REF 330) AI. HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Crown reduce 1 no. Sycamore tree to its main stem to leave as a monolithic structure, as the tree is very old and showing serious signs of decline and is becoming dangerous at St Peters Church, Church lane, Hutton Works to Protected Trees Resolved Not to object to the application.

23/266 Representatives reports:

- In Bloom The group was still waiting to hear from the Yorkshire in Bloom Trustees whether or not the village had been selected for nomination to the 2024 national competition. Beverley Rotary Association had donated a large number of purple crocus bulbs, these would be spread around public areas. An online conference was to be hosted by Northern Rail in early December, 2023.
- **SRA** The SRA Committee meeting was later in the month.
- **Pond** The Nativity scene and lights would be put up by the end of November, 2023.
- **Village Show** In addition to the regular Craft and Produce Markets, two further fundraising events had been arranged: Christmas Bingo on the 8th December, 2023 and an Antique & Collectors Fair on the 29th April, 2024.
- **BT Kiosk, Cranswick** Cllr Sibley-Calder continued to make progress in refurbishing the kiosk.
- **The Bulletin** Sample copies of the proposed new A5 sized Bulletin commencing in February, 2024 had been shared with contributors and advertisers. Feedback had been extremely positive.
- **23/267 Play Area** The East Riding Minimum Operating Standards Certificate had been renewed.
- **23/268 Gatehouse Lake** The Gatehouse Lake Angling Club had received the EA grant from the Fisheries Improvement Programme for its peg replacement programme. Due to the delay in receiving the grant the installation of the pegs had been moved back to March, 2024. It was Resolved to allow the Lake to be closed for the duration of the works.
- **23/269** Community Governance Review undertaken by East Riding of Yorkshire Council There was no change to the arrangements for Hutton Cranswick. The proposal to reduce the number of parish councillors from 13 councillors down to 10 councillors was not recommended for approval.
- 23/270 Measures to protect the Green: Parking on The Green

As The Green was protected by the Commons Act of 2006 and the Byelaws for Cranswick Green, a decision on a request to make an adjustment to the current ownership and parking arrangements at some properties at the rear of The Green was deferred pending gaining a better understanding of the legal processes involved and consideration of any wider implications.

It was important to recognise that the ownership of an area of The Green and its registration as part of the village green are distinct from each other. If the Parish Council sold the land, as suggested, the land would still be registered as village green and nothing could be done on it that was contrary to the public's right to use it as village green.

In order for a new owner to have full rights to any part of The Green purchased from the Council, the area would have to be 'de-registered'. It would be necessary to make an application to the Planning Inspectorate.

In the Council's view, the possibility that vehicles would be parked on Southgate was minimal. The properties that ran along the rear of The Green had sufficient space within the curtilage of the property, or an Easement that allowed access over The Green for two vehicles to park. It was Resolved (a) not to sell any of The Green and (b) not to make any changes to existing Easements granted by the Council.

23/271 Centenary Wood — The large bird table had been damaged. It was uncertain whether this was vandalism or accidental. Cllr Mrs Simpson welcomed the prompt action taken by Trevor Eling to clear away a fallen tree that was blocking the main footpath in the Wood. An article to promote the Wood would be included in The Bulletin.

23/272 Garden Allotments Rent had been received from all but 2 tenants.

23/273 Community Speed Watch Group — The Community Speed Watch Coordinator at Humberside Police was to be requested to identify areas within the village where a speed survey could be conducted.

23/276 Community Safety: Flooding on Southgate: A site visit to investigate the flooding problems on Southgate was being arranged between East Riding of Yorkshire Council drainage engineers and Yorkshire Water.

23/278 The Bulletin — Topics for the next Edition: (a) Centenary Wood (Cllrs Alderton and Teare) (b) Traffic Issues on Howl Lane (Cllr Teare) and (c) The Precept (Cllr Thompson).

HUTTON CRANSWICK PARISH COUNCIL Extract from the draft minutes of the meeting held on 20 December, 2023.

<u>23/287 Local Precept Demand 2024-25</u> – East Riding of Yorkshire Council had confirmed the 2024-25 tax base for Hutton Cranswick Parish as 821.7 for Band D equivalent properties. In setting the



Local Precept Demand, Councillors considered the assumed current account balance at 31st March, 2024, the financial burden on residents and the impact on Council's budgets, now and in the longer term. It was **Resolved** (a) to submit a Local Precept Demand of £38,500.00, for the financial year ending 31st March, 2025, to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and (b) earmark £11,566.00 from reserves to support the 2024-25 budget.

23/288 Gatehouse Lake — The Club had made every effort to maintain the access track by filling in pot holes. However, the condition of the track close to the entrance of the Lake had deteriorated and was in a poor condition. It was **Resolved** to undertake repairs to the track in the sum of £1450.00. To allow safe working, the track would be closed while the work was carried out. The angling club had commenced phase 2 of the peg replacement programme. Steelwork had been fabricated. Installation of new pegs was to start in March, 2024. The final stage of the programme was planned for later in 2024.

23/289 Planning Matters – The following decision was noted:

(a) 23/03028/PLF: Change of use of land for the siting of 4 glamping pods with hardstanding and associated works at Land South of Highfield Farm, Southburn Road, Hutton Cranswick – Full Planning Permission - Permission Granted – 14 Conditions.

23/290 Planning Applications:

- (a) 23/03603/PLF: Erection of single storey extension to side and rear, following demolition of garage to side at 2 Orchard Lane, Hutton Full Planning Permission Resolved Not to object to the application.
- **(b)** 23/03352/PLF: Construction of new vehicular access at Broach Hill Garage, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick Full Planning Permission **Resolved** Not to object to the application.

23/291 Representatives reports: -

- (a) In Bloom Cllr Mrs Simpson reported that the group's application to be selected for nomination to the 2024 Britain in Bloom national competition had been unsuccessful.
- (b) SRA The outcome of an FA Pitch Power inspection classed all 3 of the football pitches as advanced.

Quotes were being gathered for internal alterations of the building to enlarge the hall and make improvements to the electrical system. A complete tidy up and general housekeeping of all areas had been undertaken.

The Build sub-committee had reviewed its strategy for procurement, funding and design and build sequencing for the development of the SRA building. A Business Plan was being drafted and several large organisations, with major projects in the area, had been consulted on potential grant funding. The Committee had planned a number of fund-raising activities over the coming 12 months.

- **(c) Pond** Some maintenance work had been completed. The remaining work, which required machines to travel on The Green, would be carried out when the condition of the ground improved.
- **23/292 Centenary Wood** A suggestion for some form of barrier to be installed to the approach of where the public footpath leads out of the Wood into the field was considered, but not taken forward.
- **23/293** Risk Register Resolved to accept the Register and the Period Receipts Register. It was noted that as part of the improvements to the Council's Business Management, cloud back-up was to be adopted (Risk R1013).
- **23/294 Tree Works at the SRA** The condition of the tennis courts was suffering from contamination of mould and moss coming from overhanging trees and hedges that border the courts. The SRA Committee had requested a contribution from the Parish Council towards costs of the cutting back of the trees. It was **Resolved** to grant £1200 towards the cost of the works
- **23/296 Garden Allotments** There was one plot to let. Rent had been received from all but one tenant.

23/298 Community Safety:

- (a) Flooding on Southgate: A site visit with East Riding of Yorkshire Council's (ERYC) drainage engineers and Yorkshire Water, to investigate the flooding problems on Southgate, was still to be arranged.
- (b) Blocked drains on Howl Lane: ERYC had confirmed that the gullies had received their annual clean. However, due to the recent rainfall and the time of year, it was likely that these have possibly become blocked up again, the gully cleansing team had been requested to make a further visit. The system that runs down Howl Lane was not the responsibility of ERYC to maintain, as at one time this was a village drain, which over the years had been piped and altered, as that area had changed and as such was a riparian owned system, with ERYC only being responsible for the gullies and the leads, which are cleaned out annually. However, in light of recurring issues, ERYC Highways Team had included Howl Lane in its Jetting and CCTV programme and plan to undertake a full investigation to determine the issues that are currently being experienced on Howl Lane, with consideration given to any repairs or improvements identified.

23/300 The Bulletin – Topics for the next Edition: the Topics had been agreed at the last meeting: (a) Centenary Wood (Cllrs Alderton and Teare), (b) Traffic Issues on Howl Lane (Cllr Teare) and (c) The Precept (Cllr Thompson).

- (a) Parish Council budget: fund improvements to the footpath that runs from St. Peter's Church to Howl Lane. In 2018, East Riding of Yorkshire Council took back the responsibility for maintaining footpaths (Public Rights of Way) from all Parish Councils in the East Riding. Councillors had received a number of complaints about the condition of footpaths in the Parish. It was agreed to consider the state of footpaths at the next meeting, and footpaths would be a topic for a future edition of The Bulletin.
- (b) Install metal posts and chains to discourage vehicles driving on The Green. The Council was considering options to protect The Green from damage by vehicles.

Gatehouse Lake is situated at the end of a private road off Rotsea Lane adjoining the SRA sports ground. The site is owned by Hutton Cranswick Parish Council. The fishing lake is looked after by the Angling Club.

There is public access available at the lake. During prolonged wet periods the access road suffers from water run off from the railway embankment. Worst area is the last 200 yards before you enter the car park to the




Lake. The net effect being to wash away areas of hard core material and create potholes. The Parish Council has



organised for the road way to be repaired. This work will take place in February. Access may be restricted during this period.

The Angling Club has been improving the facility at the Lake. Their current programme includes the repair and installation of better fishing pegs. They propose to work over 2 weekends. These are 2/3 March and 9/10 March. During this time the Lake will be closed to the public.



This attractive woodland stands on an area of land that was once a chalk quarry pit. Chalk from the pit was used by local farmers and in the construction of the East Coast Railway line in the 1840s.

Once quarrying ended, the area became an ideal site for a commercial tip. In the 1970s the 3½ acres of land were bought by Hutton Cranswick Parish Council. A plan was formed to establish a woodland for local people to enjoy celebrating 100 years of the Parish Council. Thanks to a grant from FWAG (Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group), work on creating Centenary Wood began in 1995.

Over the years, Village in Bloom members planted daffodils, bluebells, snowdrops and other wildflowers in the wood. Our village scout group has built and installed nestboxes. New footpaths and seating areas have been established.

This wood, planted for the enjoyment of all, should continue to be a pleasant place to visit. Local school children, scouting and guiding groups spend time in the wood for nature study.



In 2023 Yorkshire Wolds Community Choir raised £3196 for local charities and good causes. These included: Marie Curie, Wolds Hedgehog Rescue, Driffield & Wolds Foodbank. This brings the total monies raised by the choir over the last 12 years to £25 118.

In 2024 we will endeavour to raise an equally impressive sum of money for Dove House Hospice and The Dwarf Sports Association

ERYC, along with Hull City Council, have launched an eight-week consultation on the proposal to create a Hull and East Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority (MCA), led by a directly elected mayor.

The leaders of both councils are urging all residents, businesses and other organisations to read the proposal and give their feedback. From now until 27 February, people can read the devolution proposal and give their feedback on each part of the deal at heydevolution.com

Residents can also visit any East Riding library, or any Hull library or customer service centre, where they can get help completing the survey using a computer or completing the questionnaire on paper.



There will also be a series of drop-in events across the region, where people will be able find out more about the devolution proposal. Dates, locations, and times for these will be announced at:https://www.eastriding.gov.uk/council/devolution/ Devolution (eastriding.gov.uk)
The Hull and East Yorkshire MCA would have powers to invest in areas such as transport, skills and housing, as well as an additional £400m of devolved funding over the next 30 years to invest in local priorities.

A combined authority for East Yorkshire does not mean the two councils would merge, only that they would collaborate on certain issues that affect everyone in the region.

The councils and the delivery of day-to-day responsibilities would remain separate, and local services would not be affected.





Who lived in a Workhouse?

Once at the workhouse they would be bathed, examined by the medical officer, and issued with a uniform, then sent to the Receiving or Probationary Ward. A pauper would also be placed in a "class" according to their gender, status and age. Families were also often segregated between female and male wards.

What did they eat in a workhouse?


Often children in the workhouse would be given a separate diet. In Hereford Workhouse in January 1838 children aged 5-9 were given 8oz bread, 4oz of meat and 1oz of cheese per day. Children aged 1-5; 7oz of bread, 3oz of meat and 1oz of cheeses and children under 1 had 6oz of bread supplemented with milk.

What were their jobs in the workhouses? Once an individual had entered the workhouse they would be given a uniform to be worn for the entirety of their stay. The inmates were prohibited from talking to one another and were expected to work long hours doing manual labour such as cleaning, cooking and machinery.

What were Victorian Workhouses?

Workhouses where large buildings were poor people who had no home or job lived. People

would do jobs around the workhouse in order to stay there to have a roof over their heads. As well as the poor orphaned children, the sick, disabled, elderly and unmarried mothers were also usually sent to the workhouse. After being assessed the paupers were separated and allocated to the appropriate ward for their category: boys under 14, able-bodied men between 14 and 60, men over 60, girls under 14, able-bodied women between 14 and 60, and women over 60.

What did they wear in the workhouses?

The workhouse uniforms. Firstly they would be extremely poor and possibly be dressed in rags when they entered in the workhouse. So, they needed to be issued with new clothes which were not only warm but hardwearing too.

Hutton Cranswick- Howl Lane - road safety

The Parish Council forwarded a resident's concerns regarding vehicle speeds and signage on Howl Lane, Hutton to ERYC Traffic management. Here is the reply received.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council allocate speed limits in line with directions from central government. These decisions are based on many factors including the type of road, engineering, geometry, safety history and other issues such as how built up the area and presence of street lighting. This is to ensure the speed limit is easily recognised and corresponds with similar roads nationwide.

Howl Lane meets the guidance to be a 30mph speed limit, and for this reason we would not consider lowering the speed limit on Howl Lane at this time.

We have also reviewed the collision data for Howl Lane, which shows no collisions in the last 5 years therefore Howl Lane has an excellent road safety record. This further supports the existing speed limit and shows the 30mph limit is suitable for the area.

In relation to placing extra signs, presumably to indicate 30mph speed limit, Howl Lane is a 30mph speed limit by virtue of streetlights and where a 30mph speed limit is in place by virtue of streetlighting we are not permitted to place any speed limit repeater signs.

Hutton Cranswick Parish Council

At the December council meeting, the precept (the amount the parish council levies from residents in the village via your council tax bill)



was set with an increase of just over 4%. A Band D ratepayer will pay around £47 per year to the parish council. The following budget data shows how this is used to fund activities in the village. These are just some examples of where your money is spent, there are other areas such as small donations to village groups, electricity bills, the bus shelters and war memorial that make up this amount but as a council we hope that people see value for money in the way the precept is spent.

£3.17 toward the SRA, £3.09 toward the upkeep of the Play area, £2.54 toward the Bulletin, 76p toward the In Bloom team, £2.03 toward the upkeep of parish property (benches, bins etc),

£3.91 toward
establishment (Hall
hire, insurance, legal
expenses, audit fees).
95p toward
Gatehouse Lake,
92p toward Centenary
Wood and
£2.14 toward grass
cutting on the Green.

We are lucky in this village that whilst we use the precept to pay for things, our total budget for 2024/25 is around £74,000. The precept will make up £38,500 and the rest is covered by the rental income from the farming allotments and reserves if needed by the council.

If anyone would like to make other suggestions or has any more questions about how we set our budget, please get in touch with the clerk or come along to a council meeting where we have a public participation slot early on, usually around 7.10 pm.






